To Stage Lenten Drama At First Presbyterian

"Eyes Upon the Cross," a series of vignettes depicting the feelings of people who were at the cross when Jesus was crucified, will be presented by the Westminster Drama Guild on Palm Sunday, April 11, at 8 p.m. at the First Presbyterian Church of Farmington.

The audience will be asked to imagine themselves as part of the crowd that watched what occurred on the skull-shaped hill over 2,000 years ago. The script is a question: "How could Jesus have lived after the experience of the cross?" and the Christian answer in faith to that question provide the impact of the play.

MRS. HAROLD HAYWOOD is one of several fine directors depicting the Drama Guild and returns to guide the many rehearsals required of a faithful cast to produce such plays as the Guild has presented in the past.

The play is somewhat unique in that there is no lead character in the usual sense of the term, but rather each member of the audience becomes the "lead" as he keeps his eyes upon the cross.

Elder Charles Kinsey of the Farmington Church will narrate the play. Friends of the church and all in the community interested are welcome and invited to attend.
