

# Oakland Comm College Doors to Open This Fall

Oakland Community College will open its doors this fall with a staff equipped to handle 300 full-time students. The Auburn Heights and Lakes campuses will be completed by this time, with the Orchard Ridge campus located in Farmington opening in the fall of '68. So stated Dr. John E. Tirrell, president of the college, at a 25 high school publication editors in the area April 6. Paul D. Martin represented the Blue and White.

A look into the near future has been projected by Dr. Tirrell and his staff. The college is now planning facilities to accommodate some 12,000 to 15,000 students by the year 1970.

Dr. Albert A. Canfield, Vice-President for Instruction, has been placed in charge of the new self-instructional study "carrel." A former faculty member of Purdue University, Dr. Canfield is considered to be an expert on the latest methods of tutorial approach.

The college will open with about six hundred separate "carrels" which will be assigned to separate departments such as mathematics, English, French, and electronics. Each of these departments will be furnished with several video taped movies, slides, sound tracks, and other instructional materials and will be open for student use from 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. daily.

Faculty members will prepare lectures for the video tapes and sound tracks and students will be able to learn from them at their own convenience. A sufficient number of instructors will always be on duty to aid students while working with the "carrel."

Other facilities will include a swimming pool for each campus which at given times will be open to public groups throughout the Oakland County area. A five hundred seat theater has been planned for the Orchard Ridge campus. The theater is scheduled for completion by the fall of '67. High schools will be able to use it.

Large tracts of land have been purchased for each campus to handle the enormous problem of student parking. Since all students attending the college will be commuting from home each day the administration must allow one parking space per student. The 147 acre Orchard Ridge campus will have over 50 acres of just parking space.

Dr. Tirrell related six objectives that must be met by the junior college to fulfill the growing importance of higher education.

These objectives are: a good transfer program for students wishing to further their education at a four year college; a general and basic education for the average student who does not wish to attend a higher institution of learning; a development program to remove any scholastic deficiencies that were not taken care
