

Jaycee Auxiliary Seeks Aid In Redecorating YGC Office

(The following is a letter which was sent to 12 Farmington city groups by the Farmington Junior Chamber of Commerce Auxiliary. The Farmington Enterprise is reprinting the letter in the interests of reaching others who might be willing to assist them in their project.)

Farmington Citizens: We are writing to you in hopes that you will be able to help us with a most worthwhile project which we have just undertaken.

A few weeks ago, an article entitled "Youth Guidance Center, Hopes to Expand Facilities" appeared in the Farmington Enterprise and the Farmington Observer. This article pointed out the fact that the General Citizens Youth Guidance Committee has plans to improve and expand its counseling services in our community. The article also noted a major effort would be made to improve the committee's facilities at 33423 Grand River.

With a deep interest to make Farmington a better place to live, the Farmington Jaycees investigated the facilities. We found a definite need for decorating and furnishing this

Youth Guidance Center. The only contributions to the Center thus far, have come from the Farmington Township, City of Farmington and the Farmington Board of Education which have taken care of operating expenses but have not allowed for expansion or improvements.

The Jayceets are endeavoring to completely decorate and furnish the Youth Guidance Center—BUT, we will definitely need the support and cooperation from all of Farmington. The following is a list of new or used furnishings we will need:

A petitioner requests and the Zoning Board considers that the following described property be rezoned from present single residential zoning to RC multiple residential and B-2 commercial as outlined by submitted brochures. The property is located in the Northeast 1/4 of Section 3, Town 1 North, Range 3 East, Farmington Township. One parcel consists of 15.100 acres and the other of 21.802 acres for a total of 100 acres. The development intended consists of 91 acres multiple residential RC, and 9 acres for shopping square B-2 commercial. The property is located north onto 14 Mile Road and partly east onto Orchard Lake Road. The petitioner states himself as owner and as the Mel Construction Par. Co., 21822 Orchard Lake Road, Detroit 21, Michigan. BR 3-2550. Details of preliminary plan layout are at the Township Hall.

A petitioner requests and the Zoning Board considers that the following described property be rezoned from the present B-2 commercial classification to a B-1 commercial classification. The property is located upon the southwest corner of 14 Mile Road and Orchard Lake Road and having a present net size of 203 feet by 267 feet. Assessor Testing Section 3, F&A. The property is owned by Sidney J. Wimer and Melba Wimer of 3308 Sherburne Road, Detroit 21, Michigan. The petitioner is the Shell Oil Co. by P. J. Turner of 18801 W. Eight Mile Road, Detroit 19, Mich., phone 338-6808, who have a purchase agreement with the property owners. The proposed use is operation of a two-way brick ranch style gas and auto service station. A layout plan print is submitted and may be observed at the Township Hall.

A petitioner requests and the Zoning Board considers that the following described property be rezoned from present RA-3 single residential to RC multiple residential which will permit usage as a convalescent care home and rest area. The property has been under ownership and usage for the past forty years as the Children's Hospital Convalescent Home but subsequent zoning gave the area a RA-3 single-residential classification. The property owner is Children's Hospital of Michigan having address at 800 First National Building, Detroit 48226, Mich., and a co-petitioner is the Grosche Pointe Nursing Home with a purchase agreement in effect. The intended usage is as a convalescent home and to avoid conflict as a non-conforming use. The property is described as 31 acres in the west half of Section 35 lying at the southwest corner of Tuck Road and Folsom service drive. The Rouge River has been through this property since 1870. P. J. Ledyard has signed the petition as 2nd Vice President of the Children's Hospital and Joseph Mash has signed representative of the Grosche Pointe Nursing Home, 315 Fisher Road, Grosche Pointe 30, Mich.

Meeting Set to Discuss County Youth Problems

A realistic workshop conference has been planned by members of the twenty-four citizen protective service groups in Oakland County and is being co-sponsored by four

teen social service agencies and Judges Donald E. Adams and Norman R. Barnard of the Oakland County Probate Court. The workshop is scheduled for Friday, April 23, in Oakland University, Rochester, Michigan, from 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Rev. Robert Eddy of Farmington, chairman of the Greater Farmington Youth Guidance Committee, will be in attendance.

Mayors, city managers, police authorities, city council and township board members; school board officials; educators; clergymen; civic, fraternal, parent-teacher groups; professional men and women; and service club heads have been invited.

The main speaker of the day, at the noon luncheon will be R. Bernard Houston, director of the Department of Social Welfare of the State of Michigan. Workshops will be devoted to a thorough review of the functions of over 400 militant citizens of Oakland County who are members of the twenty-four protective service committees in as many local communities involved in the attempt to combat delinquency and neglect. Five workshops will be conducted with these subjects covered:

1—Citizen involvement in child welfare legislation and the development of the OAKLAND COUNTY PROTECTIVE SERVICE PROGRAM.

2—Prevention of delinquency and neglect through citizen involvement, community studies (fact finding), and programs in action.

3—The importance of a citizen group, if it is so called, of Fire Station No. 3 and a scout car, dispatched to the school, arrived in an unbelievably short time. The experienced help of these two agencies was greatly appreciated.

The matter has been discussed at all levels of school operation. At a recent Board meeting members commented with praise on the activity of the two agencies. Briefly, we wish to thank both groups for the quick response and assistance.
