## Earl Baumunk Attends 'Homemaker Rehabilitation' Officials of Industrial Ed. Meeting Training Class to Open St., Local Gov't. Speak at OLS

Earl D. Baumunk, director of the Farmington Public Schools Co-operative Training Program, and News Letter Editor of the Michigan Industrial Education Society, recently attended the Society's annual convention in Grand Rapids, April 8, 9, and 10. Some 2,500 persons were expected to attend the convention which will headquarters in the Pantlind Hotel. Commercial and educational exhibits were displayed in the Civic Auditorium. The society consists primarily of industrial arts teachers and students from junior and senior high schools, technical and trade schools, colleges and universities.

Classes in labor-saving home management and body mechanics will be offered in the Farmington area for homemakers with limitations of time, energy or physical capacity. The "Heart of the Home" series consisting of a double session is co-sponsored by the Farmington Junior Chamber of Commerce Auxiliary, the Michigan Cooperative Extension Service and the Michigan Heart Association. Classes will be held from 1:30

p.m. to 3:30 p.m. April 15 and 22, at the Ten Mile Elementary School, 32789 10 Mile Road in Farmington. **MRS. ALICE EPPLE**, Ann Arbor, Heart Association Consultant in Homemaker Rehabilitation will teach homemakers, who lack strength or dexterity because of illness, practical ways to conserve time and energy in the preparation of meals, cleaning, ironing, and other household tasks.

"There is a basic difference in homemakers' rehabilitation as compared to other vocational programs," said Dr. James B. Blodgett, president of the Michigan Heart Association. "In industry and business a disabled person can often be trained for a new job better suited to his disability. But the homemaker cannot be transferred. She wants to or is forced by circumstances to do the work of keeping a home together. The disabled homemaker has the same duties and goals and aspirations for her family as the normal homemaker and the aim of the 'Heart of the Home' program is to help her achieve her goals as much as possible."

Persons who may be interested are invited to participate in discussion of the proposed change:

The Zoning Board has proposed the following changes in the Zoning Ordinance with respect to Multiple Residential and Two Family Residential Districts:

1. Eliminate the RB Two-Family Residential District from the Zoning Ordinance and permit two-family dwellings in the Multiple Residential Districts.
2. Eliminate the present RC Multiple Family Residential District and replace it with three new Multiple Family Residential Districts as follows:
  - (a) RC-1 Multiple Family Residential District (lowest density; approximately seven units per acre maximum)
  - (b) RC-2 Multiple Family Residential District (medium density; approximately ten units per acre maximum)
  - (c) RC-3 Multiple Family Residential District (highest density; approximately fourteen units per acre maximum; similar to present RC district).
3. Add to the Zoning Ordinance the following provision applicable to Multiple Dwellings on the same lot: **MULTIPLE DWELLINGS ON THE SAME LOT:** Where more than one multiple dwelling or apartment house is constructed on a single lot or parcel of land, each such building shall have the same front, side and rear yards as would be required were each such building constructed upon a separate lot or parcel, measured, however, horizontally at right angles from the front, rear and sides of the building. For the purposes of this paragraph the owner may designate the front, rear and sides of each building, provided however, that the front and rear yards shall be adjacent to the longest dimension of the building. Area included within the required yards for the entire lot or parcel may also be included as part of the yards required by this paragraph, but no area may be used to fulfill yard requirements for more than one building. A copy of the Site Plan filed for approval as required by this Ordinance shall have drawn thereon imaginary lot lines around each building showing compliance with this paragraph. The requirements of this paragraph may be modified by the Zoning Board where the shape of a lot or parcel or other unique or unusual factors applicable to the particular lot or parcel make such requirements unduly burdensome or impractical.
4. Rezone from present RC classification to RC-3 classification those properties which have received site plan approval from the Zoning Board.
5. Rezone from present RC classification to RC-2 classification those properties which have not as yet received site plan approval from the Zoning Board.

Tentative zoning text and zoning maps may be examined at the Farmington Township Hall, any day, Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.
