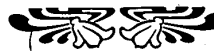

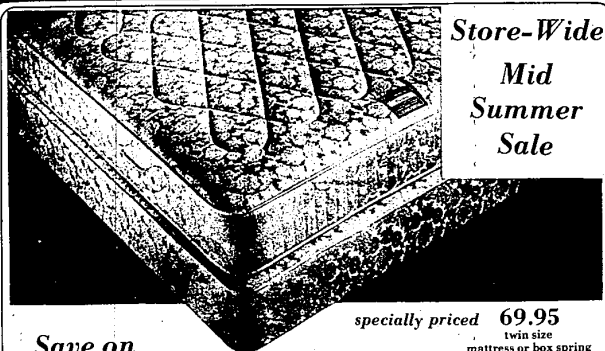

Mrs. Robert Lange of Farmington have volunteered to take over the pickup and delivery.

"When good household appliances and furniture are available, they usually can fill the request," Mrs. Chalmers said.

She also told of a retired lawyer and his wife who have worked with a "12-year-old who must have weekly trips to a counselor. There is strong evidence

that more men are coming into the FISH picture," Mrs. Chalmers said. "We have businessmen who sign up to be the telephone representative one Sunday a month."

In Plymouth, reported Mrs. Sara Humphrey, who serves with her husband, Peter, to head the Fish group, the list of volunteers recently passed the 100 mark, and some 600 calls have been answered in the first year.

That group has placed great emphasis on establishing good working relationships with the established agencies and associations in the community, Mrs. Humphreys said.

The Plymouth FISH also keeps in regular contact with its volunteers through a monthly newsletter, The Fishnet, and an occasional social gathering.

FISH activities in this area have had some surprising results, leaders report.

When the Livonia FISH came to the aid of the newcomer, the Welcome Wagon organization for, the first time became well acquainted with its activities. And when it was time to make charitable contributions for the year, that group handed over to FISH a check for \$33.27.

"The biggest donation we've ever had," said Mrs. Pat Kelly, FISH treasurer. And in Plymouth, when those emergency supplies went out, there followed what Mrs. Humphrey called "Maybe a small modern miracle."

"The people in the apartments felt some of that should be returned," she said. "So we went back to get the supplies. Curiously, more bags were returned to the Plymouth Fish closets than had been taken out."

"When the FISH line rings, you never can tell what's going to happen."
