Peru. Recently Mr. Dave Brockway, a friend from the Franklin Church, flew to Lima on business and spent a day with Margie and her co-volunteer, Alberta Garcia. He reports that both girls are well and happy and looking forward to a ten-day leave from their barracks in Chimbote.

Margie writes of their vacation saying that they flew to Arequipa, the second city of Peru, called "La Ciudad Blanca," because many of the buildings are made of a white rock dug from the nearby mountains. The altitude is 8,000 feet, and the air is cool and clean. Many Americans and English live there. It is also the home of Peru's president, Senior Belaunde, which no doubt explains the success of many of his programs in that area. Most of the barracks have light and are getting water and sewers.

Ica is an interesting town south of Lima. It is the wine and pisco center of the country. Everything here is very old including the barracks, some of which date back to 1910. Flood and earthquake damage is evident in most of these cities because it takes so long to repair the devastation. Our last visit was Huancayo. We got on the second class car of the train and started a nine hour trip. It is the highest railroad in the world, 15,680 feet, and reached by switchbacks. Crossing the cordillera we saw some very sad little towns. It is hard to realize that people can live the year round at 15,000 feet. Their faces are chapped and their hands rough. On the train some people faint because of lack of oxygen. Soon a man in a white coat came around with what looked like a beach ball with a nozzle on the end. He revivified them with a squirt of O2. It was an interesting trip through the Rimac River gorge, mining towns, and finally, the beautiful Huancayo valley. The main attraction of the town is the fair on Sunday at which the Indians from the entire valley do their trading. While visiting there I met a college friend who was six hours out of Huancayo and comes in every two weeks for mail and meat.

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Pushbutton Phones Here

Touch-Tone service, which permits callers to tap out phone numbers on buttons instead of twirling traditional dials, will be introduced in Farmington on Wednesday, April 28, by the Michigan Bell Telephone Company.

Hughes C. Bronaugh, manager here for Michigan Bell, said the new optional service will be offered to customers whose phone numbers begin with "GR 4" or "474," "GR 6" or "476" and "591."

"The principal advantage of the new service is speed," Bronaugh said. "With the new pushbutton phones callers can tap out a phone number in two to five seconds, compared with the normal dialing time of eight to 14 seconds."

THE MONTHLY CHARGE for Touch-Tone service is \$4.50 a line for residential customers and \$2 a line for business customers. A one-time, \$5 installation charge is made for both types of service.

Michigan Bell is gradually introducing the pushbutton service throughout the state. Pushbutton telephones, available only in color, come in a variety of models for both business and residential customers. There is no color charge for the Touch-Tone instruments. Also offered is a new compact wall phone, designed especially for Touch-Tone service.

Bronaugh said a new dial tone was placed in operation on Jan. 24 to prepare for the Touch-Tone service. The new tone, somewhat lower in pitch than the present signal, was adopted to provide a uniform signal that is compatible with both pushbutton and dial telephones.

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
