This week Mrs. Vayle Lorion presented to the Library a most valuable item of Farmington history. She has copied, typed and indexed "The Book of Record" kept by Nathan Power from the day he left his home in New York State, June 1, 1826 to come to Farmington, Michigan, to his death in 1874. The diary was passed on to his son, Ira L. Power, who had a son, Grant Power, who had a son, Robert, in whose possession the diary is today.

It appears to have been kept in 7 different sections, each running in consecutive days and years, giving (1) First settlements and clearings; (2) Accounts of buildings; (3) Journeys and visits; (4) Accounts of births; (5) Quaker Church activities; (6) Account of deaths; and (7) Account of winters.

"RANDOM SNATCHES from the diary:

"We started from Father Payne's the 5th day of the week 1st of 6th month, 1826. Our journey from Father Payne's to Michigan was just 10 days. Gideon was 6 1/2 months old.

"When I arrived here I had about 15 acres of land cleared and 9 acres chopped. I sowed in the fall of 1826 on my land and John's 13 acres of wheat and had about 140 bushels.

ORDINANCE NO. 15-D
An Ordinance to amend the Police and Fire Protection Ordinance of the Township of Farmington.

THE TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

A. That paragraph H. of Section 2 of the Police and Fire Protection Ordinance No. 15 of the Township, effective October 28, 1958, as amended, is amended to read as follows:

H. Promotions within the Police Department shall be made by the Supervisor on the basis of merit. Due consideration shall be given by the Supervisor in making promotions to the length of service in the Farmington Township Police Department and other police experience, to the recommendation of the Chief of Police and to the results of any examinations, oral or written, interviews or other procedures which the Supervisor may use in determining promotions. All members of the next lower rank shall be considered in filling the available promotions, subject to such reasonable length of service requirements as may be adopted by the Supervisor.

B. This Ordinance shall become effective upon first publication in the Farmington Enterprise, Farmington, Michigan.

"19th of 4th month, 1842. This completes my first year. I see that time is short and flies swift as the wings of the morning. I have endeavored through the day to call to mind the advanced state of my life and hoped that I might renew my life in Christian virtues.

"19th of 4th month, 1848. Brings me to my 45th year. It was the first day of the week. I attended meeting, a practice I have been in since childhood, though have not always been able to attend with that satisfaction to myself that I could desire.

"4th month, 19th, 1871. This day completes my 70th year. I awoke this morning in deep solemnity in reflecting that my years had reached so far beyond the common age of Man. Solemly the thought that I had been spared while nearly all of my relatives have been called from this life to their final home.

"10th month, 5th, 1887. Hul-dah and Philip took their final departure and removal to Novi where I have bought them a house and five acres of land on the 6th of 9th month (same year) for \$600.

"Winter of 1841 and 1842. 29th of 3rd month turned out our young cattle, though it was in the 6th month of 1842 that my wheat was killed by the frost on the 6 and 11th of 8th month. This was a new thing under the sun that grass was also destroyed by frost. Then followed the hard winter.

"1st month, 27th, 1868. Lydia Lothen came forward on the anxious seat in the Baptist Meeting house and with an intention to lead a christian life. I waited on her to the seat. Introduced her to the meeting. She seems to be really settled in a christian life.

"11th month, 21st, 1873. David Power was buried in our ground. He died on the 19th at his home near the north R.R. His sickness was short consecutive chills. The funeral was very large (a little snow on the ground). The sermon was preached by Mr. Wayne the Methodist preacher. He was interred under the Masonic order with considerable display and pomp, though many tears were shed on the occasion and mourning from his aged mother, Amy."

AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE 23-10

An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 23 of the Township of Farmington entitled:

"An Ordinance enacted under Act 184, Public Acts of 1943, as amended, governing the unincorporated portions of the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, to regulate and restrict the location and use of buildings, structures and land for trade, industry, residence and for public and semi-public or other specified uses; and to regulate and limit the height and bulk of buildings and other structures; to regulate and to determine the size of yards, courts and open spaces; to regulate and limit the density of population; and for said purposes to divide the Township into districts and establishing the boundaries thereof; providing changes in the regulations, restrictions and boundaries of such districts; defining certain terms used herein; providing for enforcement; establishing a Board of Appeals; and imposing penalties for the violation of this Ordinance."

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED by the Township Board of the

Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan:

Section One.

That the zoning map of said Ordinance No. 23 of the Township of Farmington, as amended, be and the same is hereby amended to show B-3 district classification where RA-4 district classification is now shown in the area described as follows:

Part of the west 1/4 of the southeast 1/4 of Section 36, T1N, R9E, Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan described as:

Commencing at the center of Section 36, thence S. 89 degrees 31' 20" E. 430.95 feet; thence S. 0 degrees 28' 40" W. 33.00 feet; thence S. 89 degrees 31' 20" E. 668.39 feet; thence S. 0 degrees 00' 40" E. 1238.50 feet to the point of beginning. Said point being on the west line of Colwell Avenue; thence S. 0 degrees 00' 40" E. 434.51 feet; thence N. 60 degrees 54' 40" W. 367.72 feet; thence S. 74 degrees 16' 00" W. 14.45 feet; thence S. 30 degrees 27' 06" W. 156.66 feet; thence N. 59 degrees 32' 54" W. 252.28 feet;

thence N. 30 degrees 27' 06" W. 80.19 feet;

thence on a curve concave to the west, whose radius is 130.00 feet, whose central angle is 28 degrees 02' 40" (chord of said curve bears N. 18 degrees 25' 43" E. 63.00 feet) a distance of 63.63 feet; thence N. 2 degrees 24' 20" E. 340.33 feet;

thence S. 89 degrees 31' 10" E. 559.26 feet to the point of beginning.

SECTION ONE-A

That the zoning map of said Ordinance No. 23 of the Township of Farmington, as amended, be and the same is hereby amended to show B-3 district classification where RA-4 district classification is now shown in the area described as follows:

Commencing at the center of Section 36, thence S. 89 degrees 31' 20" E. 430.95 feet; thence S. 0 degrees 15' 10" W. 1333.48 feet to the point of beginning. Said point being on the east line of Oxford Street; thence S. 89 degrees 43' 10" E. 273.27 feet; thence S. 2 degrees 24' 20" W. 232.21 feet;

thence on a curve concave to the west, whose radius is 100 feet, whose central angle is 28 degrees 02' 40" (chord of said curve bears S. 16 degrees 27' 06" W. 48.38 feet) a distance of 48.87 feet;

thence S. 30 degrees 27' 06" W. 80.19 feet;

thence N. 59 degrees 32' 54" W. 249.38 feet;

thence N. 2 degrees 14' 10" E. 248.89 feet;

thence N. 0 degrees 15' 10" W. 80.87 feet to the point of beginning.

SECTION ONE-B

That the zoning map of said Ordinance No. 23 of the Township of Farmington, as amended, be and the same is hereby amended to show B-3 district classification where RA-4 district classification is now shown in the area described as follows:

From the center of Section 36 run S. 89 degrees 31' 20" E. 430.95 feet; thence S. 0 degrees 28' 40" W. 33.00 feet; thence S. 89 degrees 31' 20" E. 668.39 feet along the south line of Independence Avenue (66 feet circle); thence S. 0 degrees 00' 40" W. 1933.01 feet to the point of beginning of this description;

thence S. 0 degrees 00' 40" W. 203.97 feet;

thence N. 59 degrees 32' 54" W. 481.46 feet parallel with the north line of Grand River Avenue;

thence N. 30 degrees 27' 06" E. 156.66 feet;

thence N. 74 degrees 17' E. 14.45 feet;

thence S. 60 degrees 54' 40" E. 367.72 feet to the point of beginning. Containing 1.69 acres.

Section Two.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

Section Three.

The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby ordered to take effect upon publication of the Ordinance in the Farmington Enterprise, Farmington, Michigan.

Section Four.

This Ordinance is hereby declared to have been adopted by the Township Board of the Township of Farmington, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, at a meeting thereof duly called and held on the 12th day of April 1965, in order to be given publication in the manner prescribed by law.
