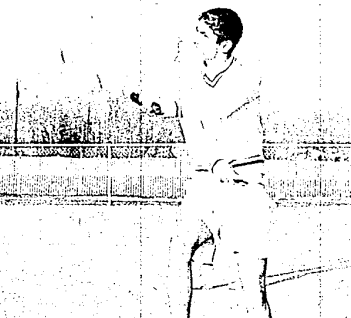

With North Farmington's 8-1 victory over John Glenn last Wednesday Coach Tom Wallis' baseball team heads into the thick of their league games with a one-win, one-loss record. Coach Wallis said that he felt his team was in good shape for the weeks ahead. He said that his predominantly young team should end the season in the upper part of the standings, maybe second or third.

THE RAIDERS NINE needed only one inning and a two-run hit from Bill Bowles, a junior batting .500, to overcome a 1-0 first inning deficit and go ahead to stay.

Junior pitcher, Chuck Viane, struck out ten John Glenn batters in winning the ball game, while receiving help from three Raider batters. Bill Bowles, John Kraft, and Bill Oldershaw each got two hits apiece

to help win the game.

IN THE GAME totals, John Glenn had one run, three hits and five errors, while North Farmington had eight runs, seven hits and two errors.

One injury was suffered in the game when John Glenn's first baseman was struck in the face by a pitched ball. He was reported to have suffered a broken nose.

In moving into the middle of the league schedule, Coach Wallis said that his team "won't break any records but we'll win our share." Franklin, he said, appears to be the team to beat again this year.

Last year Franklin won the Northwest Suburban League championship.

The Raider Coach added that his team has over-all strength with some good hitters and a few good pitchers.
