Tough Breaks Plaque NFHS Diamondmen

The Farmington Senior High baseballers have as yet to break into the win column as they suffered two more defeats last week to extend their streak to six straight games. Both losses were accompanied by a shutout. In the six games Farmington has played, only three Falcons have crossed the plate.

Walled Lake pitcher, Dick Richardson, pitched a masterful one-hit shutout against the Falcon nine. For 6-2/3 innings it looked as though a perfect game was being pitched against Farmington as 20 batters in a row were retired with no man reaching first base.

Carl Misch played the spoiler role in the seventh as he lined a double to right center, after striking out twice. Carl then stole third, but that was the farthest he got as Richardson retired Mike Perry on a pop-out to end the game. Eleven Falcons went down to the tune of a strikeout and only two balls were hit out of the infield. Wayne Johnston and Frank Mellert pitched for Farmington with Johnston taking the loss.

The Falcons were a little shaky in the field as they committed five errors. Only two of the seven runs were earned as Farmington made the error of being lackadaisical in the field. Walled Lake scored two in the first on a walk, a single and two errors. Two more runs crossed the plate in the second on three straight singles. A lone run scored in the third on a walk, error and a single and two hits and two errors produced two more runs in the fifth.

Pontiac Northern again shut-out Farmington by a score of 2-0 with Roger Hayward pitching for the Huskies. A great pitching effort by Wayne Johnston held Pontiac scoreless in the first after they had loaded the bases.

Falcon Ron Lee led off the second with a single to left and advanced to second on an error. But a mix-up on the bases found Lee picked off second. Wayne Johnston was then safe on an error in a play that would have seen Lee score. The only other Farmington players that reached base were Terry Nielson on a walk, Tom Donoghue on an error, and Wayne Johnston again on a single.

Wayne Johnston pitched a fine ball game as he allowed only six hits and struck out six. The two runs scored against him were earned as Pontiac put their singles together for production.

Farmington has been outscored 37-3 and out-hit 42-17. One of the big disappointing factors on the offensive attack has been the strikeouts.

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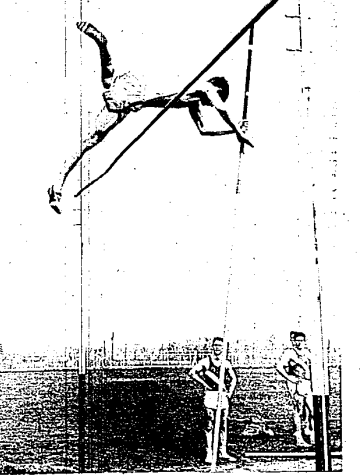
