**Second Weekend Run to Open
 For Powerful Players' Drama**

Painting a brutal and arresting picture of a half-filled southern household, the vital tragedy, "The Little Foxes," outstanding among American dramas of the past decade, will open its second weekend run Friday night, May 14, at The Barn Theatre.

Skilfully cast from the ranks of The Farmington Players, the play, directed by Don Craig, opened its five-performance run May 7.

Everyone hates everyone with smouldering fury in the play, written by ace feminine dramatist Lillian Hellman, which saw nearly 400 performances on Broadway before it went on tour throughout the U.S. and in leading world capitals. Screen rights were purchased for \$150,000 and New York critics voted "The Little Foxes" as its season's most outstanding drama.

NOTHING BUT the might of riches and power will satisfy Regina, compellingly acted by Kaye Britton in the current production. When a business deal is concluded by the Hubbards with the northern investor, Marshall, portrayed by Edwin Budgen, she enters into a brutal struggle with her two knavish brothers, Ben and Oscar, played by Don Craig and Joel Hepner.

Before the tense drama reaches its savage conclusion, greed and viciousness have blasted the family apart. The invalid husband of Regina, Horace, here enacted by Stuart Orman, and the pitiful repressed Birdie, Oscar's wife, in which role Mary Ann Perry appears, goes to pieces. The younger generation, Alexandra (the decent one), Caroline Stutson and Leo (the villainous one), go their separate ways, as family servants, Cal and Addie, played by Bessie and Charles Hannan, provide a tie of Greek chorus to comment upon the ominous goings-on.

THE PICTURE of the battling Hubbards, in their ruthless plotting, is not a pretty one, but the compelling power of Lillian Hellman's play, the brilliant dialogue and sharp character drawing make "The Little Foxes" a night in the theatre not soon forgotten.

As described by critic Richard Watts, Jr., in the N.Y. Herald Tribune, "Through its scornful indignation, 'The Little Foxes' becomes a scorching and heartfelt parable of the rise of the industrial south in all its ruthlessness, its savage sense of realism, and its fine scorn for the older trappings of Confederate romanticism."
