

## FHS Trackmen Capture Fifth in State Regionals

The Farmington Senior High track squad captured fifth place at the State Regional Meet last Saturday at Bentley. Two boys, Gary Lockwood and Ron Shortt, turned in fine individual performances and qualified for Saturday's State Finals in East Lansing.

Lockwood finished third in both the 100 and the 200 on times of 10.05 and 23.0 to earn a trip to the finals. He also ran the anchor leg of the 880 relay unit, which won its heat in a time of 1:33.1. The relay quartet lowered its best time two seconds by using the new International Baton Exchange, which allows the runners to begin running 11 yards in front of the exchange zone.

Continuing to raise the school record almost every time he competes, Ron Shortt was one of four vaulters to clear 13 feet and was awarded first place because he had fewer misses at earlier heights.

In the Mile Run, Bruce Anderson won his heat in a time of 4:39.1 and Bob Donovan finished third in 4:54 as both turned in their fastest times ever.

In the 880 Yard run, career bests were turned in by Chip Terry and Randy Taggart, who were timed in 2:04.6 and 2:07.1.

Sophomore Mike Ellis turned in a fine time of 23.8 in his heat of the 220 but failed to place in the finals.

The Mile Relay team ran its fastest time of the year as Larry Groff, Chip Terry, Gary Scholz, and John Grimes were clocked in 3:34.1.

John Grimes ran outstanding relay legs on both the 880 and Mile Relay, including a 53.6 quarter in the latter.

Gary Scholz ran a 50.8 and Leslie Swartz set the Quarter Mile, as they also turned in their best times of the year.

After the State Finals, the squad will defend their Inter-Lakes Conference title at Walled Lake on Wednesday. Farmington has won the championship the past two seasons and Wednesday's meet shapes up to be one of the closest ones in years.

## C'ville Runners Winners Again In Track Meet

Victory was again at the feet of the CHS Trojans track team as they defeated the Mustangs of Northville and the Lakers of West Bloomfield on Tuesday, May 11, at Northville. The final score was 69, CHS; 36 1/2, NHS; and 31 1/2, WBHS.

Three track records were set at this meet. Larry Buchheit set the school record for the mile with a time of 4:39.4, breaking Larry Weinber's record of 4:42.1.

In the half mile Doug Waack with a time of 2:05.4, surpassed the year-old record of 2:06.5 set by Leslie Swartz.

Jeff Waldman again lowered his own quarter-mile of 52.9 seconds to 52.0 seconds. This was the third time this year that Waldman broke the .440 yard record.

Waterford downed Farmington 11-2 early last week in a game that was full of mishaps. Waterford chalked up 11 hits in the onslaught as they capitalized on six Falcon errors. Farmington scored their two lone runs in the second as Wayne Johnston led off with a stand-up triple and scored on a wild pitch. Mike Perry was then safe on an error, and scored on back singles by Tom Donoghue and John Winder. Another error saw Mike Sneathy reach first and the bases were loaded with nobody out.

DYK JOHNSTON smashed a hot liner to third and the third-baseman made a fine grab and dove to third but the runner beat him to the bag. Terry Nielsen then drove a righty back to the pitcher and a double play erased the threat. After this short rally 13 Falcons went down in a row and a single by Wayne Johnston was all Farmington could manage. Wayne was also busy on the mound as he checked for the Falcons but had a loose defensive unit to work with.

In an extra-inning contest, Walled Lake edged out Farmington 2-1. Walled Lake struck first in the game as two errors and two singles provided a one run scoring punch. The Falcons tied the game in the bottom of the seventh as Wayne Johnston singled and advanced to third on an error. A sacrifice fly by Ron Lee scored Johnston and the game was deadlocked at 1-1. The first batter in the eighth for Walled Lake drilled one to right center. Falcon center-fielder, Tom Donoghue, attempted to make a diving catch but missed the ball by inches and the ball skipped by for a homerun.

JOHN WINDER pitched a brilliant ballgame for Farmington in his first appearance on the mound. He allowed only six hits, and struck out six in his debut. He deserved a better fate, but "that's the old ball game."

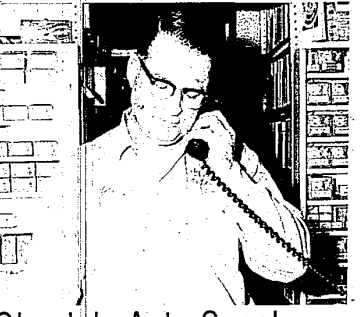
