

Jaycee Music Scholarships Are Awarded Totaling \$300

The Farmington Junior Chamber of Commerce held its annual music scholarship recital at Farmington High School on May 11. Scholarships are presented by the Jaycees to junior and senior high school students in the Farmington School District who display exceptional talent and who desire to attend a summer music camp. This year's awards were designated by the Club as Max Beck Memorial Music Scholarships in memory of a recently deceased member who was to have been chairman of this year's program.

Seventeen students entered the competition this year and seven were declared winners of scholarships. Most of the seven desire to attend the Interlochen Camp this summer.

Clarenceville Hosts Regional Track Meet

On Saturday, May 15, nearly 700 high school boys representing thirty-four class "A" and "B" schools from the metropolitan area met at the Clarenceville Athletic Field to compete for a place in the state finals and points toward a team regional title. Beginning at 10 a.m., the events lasted throughout the day and the final awards were presented at 5:30 p.m.

Winning the Class "B" honors was the well balanced team from Cranbrook while Birmingham Groves edged out their neighbor Birmingham Seaholm by three points to win the Class "A" division.

ALONG WITH the desire to win and score well, many of the boys in the afternoon events wanted to show well as the television cameras were taping many of the events for replay on May 22. The large Channel 50 control van was set near the finish line of the many running events and both happy victors and disappointed losers were seen. In some cases, special interviews were made with the winners.

No state records were set at this meet, but many outstanding performances were displayed. Perhaps the most exciting event was the one-mile run by Tom Kearney of Bloomfield Hills as he won his event in a time of 4 minutes, thirteen and eight tenths seconds which was just six tenths of a second short of the state record.

With the early morning heat and the afternoon clouds it made a near perfect day for track events. The meet director was Mr. Lynn Nutter the Clarenceville Athletic Director.

Initiative, self-direction, and a creative desire to find out, paid off recently for Vicki Canale, a fifth grade student at Longacre Elementary School in Farmington. She is a student of Mr. Maynard Harris.

WATCHING W.T.V.S., Channel 55 Educational Television for the science program "Adventures in Science," Vicki became interested in a project on sound. Using various recording boxes at home, she constructed a "zitter" using a cigar box, rubber bands, an inclined plane, and aluminum foil.

Using the principle of plucking, Vicki proceeded to produce two musical tunes on her project. The inclined plane stretched the rubber bands, thus giving each one a different pitch. The hollow cigar box and the aluminum foil helped trap the sound so it could be heard.

Knowing that Project Day was coming up, Vicki composed a letter explaining her project. She was accepted and appeared with ten or eleven other fifth graders on May 14 from 1:55 p.m. to 2:25 p.m.

Wayne State University: Sharon Rudman, who will enroll in Wayne.

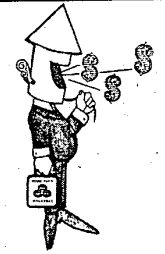

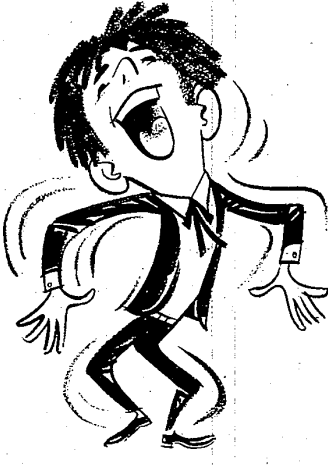
