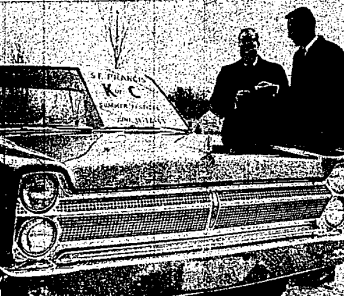

City Council Proceedings

A Special Meeting of the Council of the City of Farmington was held on May 13, 1965, for the purpose of a Public Hearing on the 1965-66 Budget.
Meeting called to order at 8:05 p.m. by Mayor Brotherton.

ROLL CALL: Mayor Brotherton, Councilmen Allen, Peterson, Thayer and Yoder present. (ABSENT: None).
CITY OFFICIALS: PRESIDENT: City Manager Dinan and Clerk Quinn.

PUBLIC HEARING 1965-66 BUDGET
Mayor Brotherton opened the Public Hearing on the 1965-66 Budget and stated that the Notice of Hearing had been published in the Farmington Enterprise and asked for comments from all interested persons.

Mayor Brotherton stated that the high lights of the 1965-66 Budget provided for \$72,000.00 in Capital Improvements, \$12,650.00 in Water & Sewer and \$8,500.00 in the Recreation Account.

COMMENTS
Mr. W. Allen Nelson, 23708 Warner, questioned the procedure following the adoption of the 1965-66 Budget relative to any changes on allocations to various accounts and Council action.

He stated that he did not have any objections at this time to the allocation in the Park Fund of \$9,000.00 for Park Land Purchase and would reserve any comments until the proper time.

City Manager Dinan stated that the 1965-66 Budget is designed as a guide in the performance of fiscal activities. Allocation to various accounts can be transferred by Council action if necessary and all purchases over \$1,000.00 must be approved by the Council.

COUNCIL COMMENT
Councilman Thayer stated that the Council had met in executive sessions to review and adjust the proposed Budget. He stated that he had no further comments.

Councilman Peterson stated that the proposed 1965-66 Budget was a complete, well rounded Budget and provided for additional Capital Improvement and replacement of needed equipment.

Councilman Yoder commended the City Manager on the presentation of the 1965-66 Budget. He stated that as usual, it was a good budget and since many copies of the budget had been obtained for review and there are no comments, therefore, it indicated that the citizens approve of the Budget.

Councilman Allen stated that the 1965-66 Budget was a good

budget, however, he had two reservations as follows:

1. That the Council consider in the near future or the next Budget, some assistance for the City Manager, the Water & Sewer Department and the Public Works Department.

2. Increase the Park facilities in the southern part of the City in the School area from the recreation budget. He stated that this subject was discussed at the Planning Commission meeting.

Mayor Brotherton stated that the 1965-66 Budget will accomplish the following programs:

1. Enable the City to replace old equipment, to provide services to the citizens and to maintain the Streets and Parks in the manner the Council desires and represents a long term investment.

2. To increase the salaries of the City Employees and remain on a pay with other Cities in the area and to assure the Council of continued experienced employees.

3. To provide for an increase in the Recreational Fund for a Director and expand the Recreational facilities and provides for \$9,000.00 for land purchase adjacent to the City Park for nature trails, etc. He stated that the funds allocated are set aside for the purpose of Park Improvement when a specific plan is prepared or could be used to pay off present land contracts.

He stated that there is a possibility of providing a picnic area on School property at Flanders School to include picnic tables or grills if the Farmington Public Schools approve this program.

Motion by Yoder seconded by Peterson that the Public Hearing on the 1965-66 Budget be declared closed. Motion carried, all ayes.

Mayor Brotherton stated that the next regular meeting of the Council will be held on Monday, May 17, 1965, which is Mayor's Exchange Day and two Councilmen will be absent.

Mayor Brotherton recommended that the 1965-66 Budget be adopted at this meeting since there were no objections to the proposed Budget.
