Of the 1,000 Farmington children entering Farmington Schools each year, about one in ten will need some extra help. And about one in every hundred will need placement in a special classroom. Not only must special education meet this growth need, but also it must continue to expand its program and refine its services.
Oakland County's special education program is widely acclaimed. Voter approval is needed to continue to provide an education for these children.
FARMINGTON'S PROGRAM is an important part of the county's total. In ten years, special education in the district of Oakland County has grown to 383 programs serving 2,718 children in classrooms and another 14,000 who need extra help to stay in regular classes.

Governmental Unity Sought By Democratic Party Head

Farmington Democratic Club Chairman Aldo Vagnotz is pushing for establishment of a closer working relationship between the Farmington area's various governmental units in his report this week to the county Democratic Party meeting. The meeting was held at 8 p.m. at the City National Bank, Ten Mile at Orchard Lake.
He said a group made up of representatives of the City of Farmington, Farmington Township, the Farmington School District, Clarensville School District, Zoning Boards, and Farmington District Library Board should meet regularly to consider common problems and set common goals.
Vagnotz said several recent events led him to propose such an approach.
