A Regular Meeting of the Farmington Township Board was called to order on May 24th, A.D. 1965 at 8:00 p.m. by Mr. Curt Hall, Chairman. Members present were Hall, Cairns, Duke, Walter and Bassette. Opperhauser and Avery absent. Also present was Mr. Joseph T. Brennan, Township Attorney.

MOTION by Cairns, supported by Duke, that the proposal of Kenower, MacArthur Company to purchase said bonds of \$275,000 "1964 Sewer Special Assessment" Bonds, Series "I" at par and accrued interest to date of delivery, plus a premium of \$61.05 and bearing interest per annum as follows:

MOTION by Duke, supported by Bassette, that the Zoning Map of said Ordinance No. 29 of the Township of Farmington, as amended, be amended by Ordinance No. 29-11.

TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE 29-11

An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 29 of the Township of Farmington, entitled "Zoning Ordinance 29-11."

"An Ordinance enacted under Act 184, Public Acts of 1943, as amended, governing the unincorporated portions of the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, to regulate the height and bulk of buildings and other structures; to regulate and to determine the size of yards, courts and open spaces; to regulate and limit the density of population; and for said purposes to divide the Township into districts and establishing the Boundaries thereof; providing for changes in the regulations, restrictions

and boundaries of such districts; defining certain terms used herein; providing for enforcement; establishing a Board of Appeals; and imposing penalties for the violation of this Ordinance."

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED by the Township Board of the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan:

Section One.

That the zoning map of said Ordinance No. 29 of the Township of Farmington, as amended, be and the same is hereby amended to show RC district classification where RA-1 district classification is now shown in the area described as follows:

A parcel of land being a part of the West half of Section 35, Township 1 North, Range 9 East, Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan, more particularly described as:

Beginning at the center post of said Section 35; thence North 0 degrees 17' East along the North and South quarter line of said Section 35 as now monumented by the Michigan State Highway Department 591.38 feet to a point; thence North 75 degrees 21' 40" West 844.20 feet to a point; thence South 0 degrees 32' 20" West 10.41 feet to a point; thence North 13 degrees 31' 40" West 183.28 feet to a point; thence South 0 degrees 12' 30" West 910.04 feet to a point; thence South 83 degrees 52' West 34.10 feet to a point; thence South 89 degrees 08' East 584.89 feet to a point; thence South 89 degrees 47' East 1327.57 feet to a point on the North and South quarter line of said Section 35 as now monumented by the Michigan State Highway Department 569.15 feet to the point of beginning, containing 33.9799 acres more or less.

Section Two.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

Section Three.

The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby ordered to take effect upon publication of the Ordinance in the Farmington Enterprise, Farmington, Michigan.

Section Four.

This Ordinance is hereby declared to have been adopted by the Township Board of the Township of Farmington, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, at a meeting thereof duly called and held on the 24th day of May 1965, in order to be given publication in the manner prescribed by law.

Roll Call Vote: 5 Yeas, 0 Nays. Carried-unanimous.

MOTION by Walter, supported by Bassette, that the Board of Farmington Township of Old Franklin Towne Subdivisions No. 2 and 3, as presented, be given publication in the manner prescribed by law.

Roll Call Vote: 5 Yeas, 0 Nays. Carried-unanimous.

MOTION by Walter, supported by Bassette, that the settlement for \$3,000.00 as recommended by Township Attorney Joseph T. Brennan. Carried-Duke abstained.

MOTION by Cairns, supported by Walter, that Special Assessment District be established for construction of water improvements for Woodcroft Subdivision, and that the Public Hearing on necessity for water in said Woodcroft Subdivision be held on June 15th, 1965 at 8:00 o'clock p.m., and that the Clerk do notice. Roll Call Vote: 5 Yeas, 0 Nays. Carried-unanimous.

On Motion made, supported and carried the meeting was adjourned at 9:24 p.m.

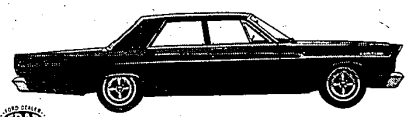
