The area proposed to be an-nexed into the city is that property located west of Gill Road between Grand River Avenue and the I-96 Express-way and extending all the way to Halsted Road, one mile

way to Haisted Road, one mine east of Farmington Township's western boundary. According to City Manager John Dinan there were ap-proximately 15 who circulated

the petitions over the weekend and they obtained the signatures of 502 cilizens. The city manager said that he was certain that while some of the signers were township residents the bulk of those signing were from the city.

A map showing the area proposed to be annexed appears on Page 8-A.

At 8:30 Monday moraing the petitions were filed at the Oakland County Clerk's office. There can be little question that there are not enough valid signatures on the petition, the city manager said. The law

requires the signatures of only one per cent of the total population as of the last official census which was in 1960. The combined city and township population as of the 1960 census was approximately 35,000, Dinan stated, The proposed annexation will now be referred to the boundaries committee of the Oakhand County Board of Supervisors for review and then come before the Board of Supervisors for action and the setting of a date for an election. The city manager estimated that it would probably take 90 days or more before

the election could be held which would make it some time in September at the earliest.
