Hire Reading Specialist For School Dist.

The employment of a read-ing specialist for the Farm-ington schools was approved by the Farmington Board of Education at their June 28

Education at their June 28 meeting. Miss Katherine Van Hoy, who has been taking in-service training at the County level, will work in school buildings not now involved in special reading programs-two build-ings directly, and four info-tions of the 1085-66 school year are to screen all third grade classrooms in Farming-ton. Third grades were chosen because dissolities are more easily discovered at that grade level. The screening will serve as a guilde for future reading meeds.
