The following is quoted from a Master Plan Study prepared by Villan - Leman and Associates, planning consultants to the Township of Farmington, which is self-explanatory:

"The commercial land use pattern for the Township of Farmington should be in accordance with the ultimate build up of residential lands and the population to be served. In order to arrive at a well balanced commercial base, certain factors of income and purchasing power must be determined. In other words, an attempt must be made to define the ultimate population and the ultimate family incomes for various areas of the township, and to further current consumption items. The methods employed in this study involve the use of accepted expenditure figures compiled by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and dollar volume expenditures computed from the Real Estate Research Corporation and other reliable sources.

The commercial land use pattern is based on:
1. Average family incomes.
2. Potential purchasing power.
3. Dollar volume per square foot of commercial uses based on potential purchasing power."

Spends Summer Studying, Touring In Alaska Area

Eskimos, toads, and panning for gold are no longer strange to Robert Thompson of the Clarenceville High biology department. Mr. Thompson spent the past summer in Alaska as a student at the University of Alaska near Fairbanks.

Thompson attended on a special grant from the National Science Foundation. He was named by the University of Science. Mr. Thompson's special field project was the study of plant hormones.

During his stay, Thompson, through Friday, consisted of mathematical methods, philosophy, lectures in biology and special areas of science projects.

Thompson traveled some 4,800 miles by car. Approximately 1,500 miles of this distance was over gravel roads. The family was on the road seven days. Valdez is one of the most important seaports in Alaska.
