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**Gifted Youths' Learning Range Varies Widely**

Gifted children, along with other pupils, show a wide range in their ability to learn, according to Warren A. Ketcham, associate professor of education at The University of Michigan.

Writing in the Merrill-Palmer Quarterly published by the Merrill - Palmer School, Detroit, Professor Ketcham declares that gifted children grow in many ways.

"In the light of the evidence, it is more likely that the abilities of many gifted pupils are misdirected and obstructed by a premature emphasis on the teaching of particulars and essentials and a consequent lack of broad and rich opportunities to learn."

He feels that an essential part of any educational program for the gifted is "an adequate testing program which keeps teachers, parents, and, in the later grades, the pupils themselves informed as to their abilities, aptitudes, interests and progress."

Chief problem in providing adequately for the education of the gifted, as Ketcham sees it, lies in meeting individual differences among the children. At the University School, Ann Arbor, a number of well-known educational techniques are used. These are: unit or project teaching, the core program, the policy of absorbing extracurricular activities into the curriculum, problem solving, and teacher-pupil planning.

"These are not new ideas, but they help teachers cut across ability and subject matter lines," Professor Ketcham concludes.

**Polio Victims Meet Here, Are Married in Their Wheel Chairs**

It took Farmington Township's Sister Kenny Foundation hospital to bring a young couple together, but the polio victims found romance here.

In culminated last Sunday afternoon, in the marriage of Kay Elliott, 17, to James Ray, 22, at Covenant Baptist Church.

**THE COUPLE** will live in a small home at 22809 Furton, at St. Clair Shores, and their story behind this, too, Jim had made a \$1,500 down payment on the home.

To help them pay off the rest of the mortgage on the house, and meet other expenses, a small group of St. Clair Shores neighbors hoped to raise \$10,000 Wednesday night by a public reception near there. Their reception was also a birthday party for Jim, who was 23 Wednesday.

She still needs an iron lung three nights a week. He needs a rocking bed to exercise his muscles.

The wedding Sunday afternoon was brief. The bride and her attendants wore ivory broadcaded dresses. Kay wore a crown of pearls, and a fingertip silk veil.

**HER FATHER**, David L. Elliott, a Battle Creek school teacher, wheeled her down the aisle. Her mother, Mrs. Louis Gasper of Hillsdale, rubbed at her eyes with a handkerchief.

Gerald Dehring of Dearborn was best man, and wheeled Jim to the altar. At the end of the ceremony, friends, sending the wheelchairs around so the bride and groom could kiss.

Then they wheeled them up the aisle—as husband and wife.

The cost of modern schools runs as high as \$50,000 a classroom, which gives interest to a bill of news from Woodside, California. 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**Fishing License Sales Decline**

Michigan's army of lake fishermen this summer was smaller than last year's turnout, according to latest fishing license sales reports.

Through August 31, some 677,000 license sales were reported — a three percent decrease from the 697,000 sold during the same period last year.

Nonresident anglers showed an even greater decline, with sales of annual nonresident permits totaling 106,000 — down more than eight percent from last year. The sale of 15-day departmental fishing licenses dipped four percent to 57,000.

Meanwhile, trout fishing maintained its popularity with sales of some 185,000 trout stamps — just about the same number reported sold through August, 1956.

No explanation is certain for the decline in lake fishermen, but many anglers have registered complaints about increasing use of motor boats on inland lakes for water skiing and pleasure boating and this may be a factor affecting fishing pressure.

Michigan's spring and summer weather generally was warmer than last year, with less rain, and outdoor recreation increased. For example, attendance at state parks this year has been running about 1,000,000 above the 1956 level and tourist business has shown similar gains.

Last year, Michigan sold a total of 1,138,000 fishing licenses. At the present rate of sales, the 1957 total would be approximately 1,100,000. The all-time high sales total was set in 1954, with some 1,188,000 licenses issued.

Michigan has had at least 1,000,000 licensed anglers per year since 1947.

**How to Use Leftover Bread So It Will Be Popular With All**

Leftover bread is often the most wasted item of food in many homes, yet it has innumerable uses and is a valuable asset to the food specialists. If bread puddings are not popular with members of the family, the bread can be used for any number of fruit puddings.

Fine crumbs (made by drying the bread in a warm oven, then putting it through the food chopper) are handy for breading chops. Crumb, salt and pepper with a generous amount of paprika is a good combination to use for breaded meats.

Fish, sliced liver and sliced eggplant brushed with melted fat and then dusted with this crumb mix may be baked quickly in a hot oven (300 degrees) for 12 to 15 minutes. This combination emerges looking and tasting better than when done in a frying pan.

Again, cut the crusts from not too dry, thickly-sliced bread and make waffle toast in the waffle iron. Or, completely dry and store leftover bread for use with soups and salads, using it as melba toast.

Egg whites are also neglected leftovers. The specialists suggest you beat an extra egg white with a glass of hot jelly until stiff. It makes a delicious quick cake frosting. An egg white beaten with applesauce is a simple and good dessert.

Leftover cereals and finely chopped cooked spaghetti and noodles are good extenders for meats, loaves and croquettes.
