Problem Results With Small Cars

in the Michigan Department of Health.

Most persons, she explains, estimate distances through a complicated thought pattern based privately a complicated thought pattern based privaches another car from the rear at night, he knows from having experienced similar situations in the past that a certain amount of space between two tail lights means that the car is 'a certain distance down the road.

During the daytime people learn to judge the distance of a car by relating its size to that of trees, telephone poles and the width of the road.

"The smaller cars are enough."

"The ismaller cars are enough different in size," Miss Austin said, 'so they don't fit our old dexperience patterns. This means we must change our habits of judging distance or we may find our selves howing into a small car. "In time, all drivers through experience will develop new standards for judging distance." Miss Austin concluded." Until then, drivers should play it safe by assuming that every ear in the distance is a shall one until proven other wise."

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
