



## Report Waterfowl Bags Only Fair

Hunters enjoyed only moderate success on the October 1 opening of the waterfowl season, with weather and hunting conditions unfavorable.

Reports from Conservation Department field personnel indicated weather generally was fair and quite warm. Heavy foliage hampered visibility for grouse hunters while waterfowl hunters reported limited duck movements.

Ducks appeared in about the same numbers as last year, except in the Saginaw Bay area where populations were increased somewhat. A slight apparent movement into the Bay area last

Fewer ducks were reported at Lake St. Clair and at Point Moulee, on Lake Erie. Decreases also were reported in some areas of southwestern Michigan because of dried-up ponds.

Waterfowl targets primarily were native ducks with very few diving ducks—which move in from Canada—present. Waterfowl hunting pressure generally was about the same as last year's opening day.

With more and more small cars appearing on the highways, motorists can no longer rely on longstanding habits of judging distance, according to Miss Carolyn Austin, chief of the Vision Section.

Most persons, she explains, estimate distances through a complicated thought pattern based primarily on experience.

For example, when one approaches another car from the rear at night, he knows from having experienced similar situations in the past that a certain amount of space between two tall lights means that the car is a certain distance down the road.

During the daytime people learn to judge the distance of a car by relating its size to that of trees, telephone poles and the width of the road.

"In time, all drivers through experience will develop new standards for judging distance," Miss Austin concludes. "Until then, drivers should play it safe by assuming that every car in the distance is a small one until proven otherwise."
