Co-Educational Schools' Preferred

Seems more than likely that if Betty Good went to attendance in today's college classes, Joe College would rise up and demand her return.

"I think the significance of separate education of the two sexes has largely disappeared because the automobile has caused man to be present on every woman's campus," Professor Henderson says.

"This mobility means that in their social life they do have co-education so the separatism is confined to classroom learning."

He points out that all public institutions are co-educational and that there has been a great increase in the number of two-year public institutions, all co-educational.

The professor asserts that public institutions will expand more rapidly than private institutions.

If all public institutions are co-educational, there will be a strong trend in favor of larger numbers of students in institutions that are co-educational in the future. The institutions that are for men or women only are mostly private ones that do not have the same interest in expanding that the co-educational institutions have," he says.

The educator feels that the attitude of women towards serious study "is less superficial now than it was at the turn of the century. During this period, girls' finishing schools concentrated on imparting the social graces rather than solid learning. Women began to have a pronounced vocational interest about the beginning of World War I. They went into department stores, became secretaries and began to enter the professions in greater numbers. By the time World War II began, the trend was pretty well established and superficiality disappeared."

Henderson believes some changes in curriculum are due in women's education. "I feel that most liberal arts colleges do not give the women as thoroughly as they do those of the men. Most college programs are aligned to men's interests. The women follow along and take the same courses."

"Nearly all college women now look forward to some kind of a career. Therefore, if a woman goes to college she should be extending their programs to meet women's vocational needs."
