

Grant 200,000th GI Home Loan In Michigan

The 200,000th GI home loan was guaranteed by the Veterans Administration Detroit regional office during September of this year, officials reported.

Nationally, the five millionth GI home loan was guaranteed during the month.

Lloyd H. Jameson, VA's regional office manager for Michigan, said that 200,255 home loans, totaling nearly \$1,662,702,011, have been made to World War II and Korean Conflict veterans during the 13 years the GI loan program has been in operation.

Of the \$1,662,702,011, VA has guaranteed or insured about 55 percent. Nearly 19 percent of the 200,255 home loans, or 38,080, have been completely paid back by veteran borrowers.

VA reported also that only 1,550 home loans, or less than 1 of one percent of the total, have resulted in claims paid by the Government, proving that veterans have been outstanding credit risks.

The average amount of all GI home loans made to this date was \$8,278.

In addition to the more than 200,255 home loans closed thus far, VA in Michigan had guaranteed or insured 979 farm loans and 4,151 business loans. These two types of loans totaled more than \$10,740,988.

Oakland County Courthouse Site Awaiting Ruling

No action will be taken to consult the voters of Oakland County again in proposed plans for a new county courthouse until the State Supreme Court has ruled.

The Ways and Means Committee of the Board of Supervisors has tabled a request for a special election to decide three points about the project raised by the Oakland County Taxpayers League.

In a recent court case, the League won a decision against the county on grounds that it had illegally accumulated a \$1.4 million building fund for the project, judge Herman Dehake of Harrisville ruled that the building fund money should be returned to the general fund and applied toward 1958 taxes. The county has appealed this decision.

The League wants the building located on the present site in downtown Pontiac rather than at the County Service Center in north Pontiac. It is now making three requests; that a referendum on the choice of the site be made, that the building funds for the project be freed and that a bond issue be put to a vote for the balance of the proposed \$5 million structure.

Voters approved the bond issue in 1954 but turned down the tax increase needed to retire it.

New Community Colleges Studied

Studies for a community college in this area were advanced last week in a meeting at Clarencville, with high school administrators present from Plymouth, Livonia, Redford Union and South Redford.

At this meeting Sup't Louis E. Schmidt reports that Claude Snarey, a Livonia board member, was elected president of the group. Editor Huling of the Plymouth board was named secretary.

Northville, also a member of the group, was not able to attend this meeting.

Educators in the area have held a series of meetings the last nine months, to ascertain local needs for a community college.

They want to know what people of the area want, their feeling toward such a college, and whether it should be a junior college, or provide terminal courses.

There is a financing problem, of course. Educators think the legislature would have to pass an enabling act, so that several communities could work together. Under present law one district can set up such a college and enter into agreements with others, but this may not prove practical.

The proposed area would be from Telegraph Road west to the Wayne county line, and from Joy Road to 8 Mile.

With the cooperation of Wayne State University, there are now similar studies being made in south Oakland County and northwest Wayne County. Wayne itself is making a six county study for community colleges.

Consultant for the group which met at Clarencville is Carroll Munshaw of the Wayne County Board of Education office.
