

New Republican Headquarters Open House Set

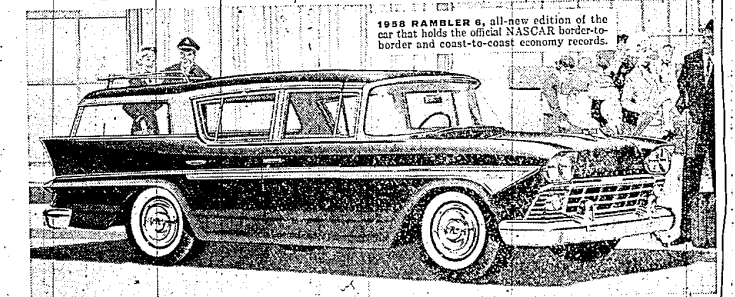
