Giants of Woodland

From British Columbia to San Francisco, along the rain-blessed Pacific slope, trees grow to gigantic size. Some Douglas fir trees may contain 50,000 board feet of lumber, enough to build five small homes. West coast hemlock and western red cedar trees grow nearly as large, some 275 feet tall, twelve feet in diameter. Few reach this huge size because insects, disease and fire take their toll. Under managed forestry, most trees are harvested at about 100 years of age.
