#### Rain, Snow Keep Forest Fires Down

Forest fire hazards were relatively low for the opening of Michigan's 1957 deer hunting season.

Rain and snowfall in many parts of the state eased dangerous conditions, but hunters were reminded the threat of fire still exists in some areas.

During the week ending November 10, fire damage on state and private lands totaled one-fifth of an acre. This loss resulted from two small fires—both in the northern lower peninsula.

To date this year, some 5884 acres of state and private forests and grasslands have been burned—compared with 3337 acres damaged during the same period last year.

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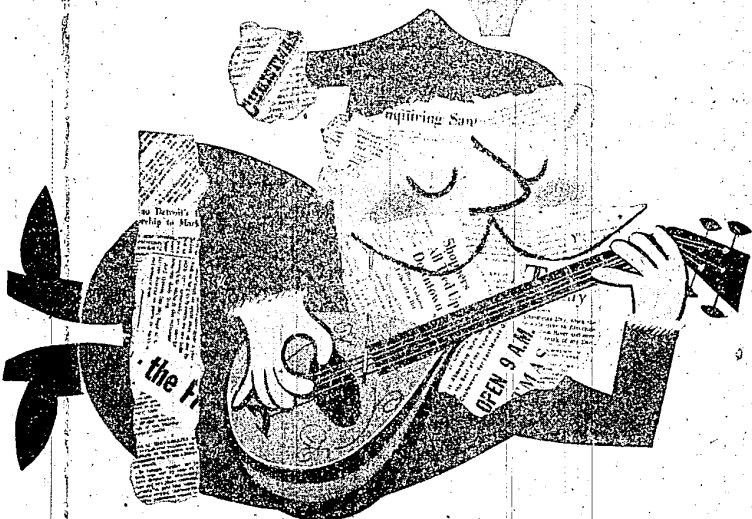
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
