Two Named 32nd Degree Masons

Two Farmington men were among a group of some 300 Scottish Rite Masons from 11 southeastern counties to receive 32nd Degrees last weekend at ceremonies in Detroit Masonic Temple.

Farmington men being awarded degrees were Wilfred J. McGuire of 30203 Overdale Court and John A. Wales of 28417 Kirkside Lane.

The 1957 fall class of degree candidates was honored at a reunion banquet attended by more than 1,500 Michigan Masons. Principal speaker at the banquet was Former Supreme Court Justice George E. Bushnell.

Rite grants totaling \$102,480 for research projects seeking causes of mental illness had been given. Two of the 27 projects covered by the grants are in Michigan, he stated.

Judge Bushnell, Sovereign Grand Commander of the Supreme Council, 33rd Degree, Scottish Rite Freemasonry, Northern Masonic Jurisdiction, said that this year this group contributed a special \$125,000 fund from which the grants are made under the direction of the National Association for Mental Health.

The fund for 1958 research projects brings to \$1,355,000 to total Scottish Rite contribution for studying causes and treatment of schizophrenia, the nation's most prevalent mental ailment.

The two Michigan research projects receiving Masonic aid are at Wayne State University, where \$50,000 went to Dr. J. S. Gottlieb, Director of the Lafayette Clinic and Professor Psychiatry, and Dr. Charles E. Frohman, Director of the Lafayette Clinic's Biopsychiatry Laboratory, for their study of available energy in schizophrenics.

Hawthorn Center, Northville, where Dr. Ralph D. Rabinovitch received \$4,000 for his study of childhood schizophrenia.
