Hare to start Michigan motorists using permanent license plates in 1959, with metal tabs for the ensuing two years. Hare said the program would require an extra \$60,000 next year to add another coat of paint to the plates, but would save about \$200,000 over the three-year period. First, law enforcement officials said the plates would become illegible and battered in the three years and tabs would be easy to counterfeit. Then, legislators said they doubted that Hare's plan would result in the savings he anticipated. Best bet is present is that Michigan will go on using one-year plates.

There are now 220 children in the state facility for mentally retarded children in Farmington, where space was leased 3½ years ago in the former Children's Hospital. The Fort Custer station hospital was leased at the same time, and the Mental Health Commission has just ordered steps taken for removal of this lease, subject to approval by the legislature. There are 800 children at Fort Custer, but the waiting list is 674. Charles P. Wagg, state mental health director, said 900 more beds will be provided in state hospitals this year, and that construction of the Plymouth state hospital must be started as soon as possible.
