Wed in Military Ceremony At Pensacola, Florida

In a ceremony marked by simplicity and beauty, Miss Dorothy Henrietta Wolfe was married to Arthur C. Rogan on Wednesday, November 27, in Our Lady of Loreto Catholic chapel at the Naval Air Station, Pensacola, Florida. The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Wolfe, 22400 Lilac Avenue, Farmington. The bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. O. S. Rogan, Newcastle, Wyoming. Preceding the ceremony, the chapel organist presented "Ave Maria" and "Pans Angelicus," and also played the traditional wedding marches.

The Reverend Gregory J. Palabicki, C.R., senior Catholic chaplain on the Air Station, performed the double ring ceremony before a background of white gladioli and white chrysanthemums, lighted by cathedral tapers in branched candelabras.

Rear Admiral A. E. Loomis, Chief of Naval Basic Training Command, gave the bride in marriage.

She wore a gown of chantilly lace re-embroidered with seed pearls and sequins, and tulle over satin. The gown was fastened with V-neckline and standing pointed collar, molded bodice above the bouffant overskirt, and long tapered sleeves ending in puffed cuffs over her hands. Interest in the floor length skirt centered on the side panels, of gathered lace alternating with rows of pink-tipped tulle.

Her veil of French illusion was draped from a crown of starched lace flowers trimmed with pearls and brilliants. She carried a white prayer book topped with a cascade of white feathered carnations, a gift of the bridegroom.

Except for the bride's traditional white wedding gown and the priest's surplice, the wedding was all military.

The maid of honor, Marguerite E. March of Port Byron, New York, and bridesmaids Helen C. Logue of Denver, Colorado, and Shirley A. Madison, petty officer third class at Nevada, Iowa, wore blue uniforms, complete with white gloves and shoes.

The best man, Petty Officer Third Class David DeHoss of Tucson, Arizona, and ushers, Donald F. Bauer, third class petty officer from Emporium, Pennsylvania, and Seaman John F. Mackey of Hartford, Connecticut, wore their Navy dress blue uniforms.

Immediately after the ceremony, a reception was held in one of the spacious old homes at the air station. In the dining room the theme of white, green and silver was carried out in the centerpiece of white daisy chrysanthemums in a high silver epergne and the large silver punch bowl on the Italian-embroidered sheer linen white cloth of the bride's table.

The bride's cake, a wedding gift to the young couple by the admiral's chef, Chief S. Ruelos, was a work of art. A large rectangle formed the base, on which a round tier rested, attached by carved lattice-work confections in leaf shape. Rising from the round tier were delicate latticed columns of confection, supporting the pedestal upon which stood a miniature bride and groom. Over the little

figures was a floral arch centered with white wedding bells tied with white satin ribbon. The entire cake was leed in a pattern simulating chrysanthemum petals.

For their honeymoon trip to Mobile, Alabama, the bride wore a sapphire blue cut velvet two-piece suit, with matching accessories, and a white-carnation corsage from her bouquet.

The couple will reside in Woolsey Court apartments, a housing development on the Pensacola Naval Air Station.

Both the young people are in the Navy. Mrs. Rogan, a seaman apprentice, is serving her initial tour of duty on the staff of Admiral Loomis. Rogan, a second class petty officer, also on Admiral Loomis staff, has completed three years of Naval service. He is a 1934 graduate of the Rock Rapids, Iowa, High School.

To Take Part In "Pinocchio"

Georgianna Brown, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy A. Brown Jr. will be one of several children from Detroit suburban areas taking part in the staging of "Pinocchio" at the Detroit Institute of Arts this Saturday, December 21.

To be given by the Detroit Puppet Theatre, the play will be an original musical version of the old favorite "Pinocchio" with both puppets and children as actors.

Eight-year-old Douglas Wassel of Birmingham, one of 42 members of the Institute's Youth Theatre Workshop taking part, will stage Pinocchio when he turns into a real live boy before the audience's eyes.

Performances will be given in the auditorium at 10:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. Tickets are 25 cents at Grinnell's downtown or the Institute box office.

Gil Oden, Curator of Theatre Arts, is producer and director. The play is an adaptation by a well-known puppeteer, George Lathrop, with music by California composer Ed Bryan and stage design by Gene Scrimphorn of the Cass High School Department of Performing Arts.

This is the first time live actors have been combined with puppets in a Detroit Puppet Theatre performance. Local professional puppeteer Gary Jennings will manipulate Pinocchio and Andrea Sha-pi-ro and Marsha Kahn of the youth puppeteer will handle the other two marionettes. Martin Shaker of Dearborn will play the live role of Gepetto, Pinocchio's wood-carver "father."
