Township Industrial Zoning

The following question and answer series in explanation of the various phases of the proposed industrial zoning for Farmington Township is being presented as a matter of public information by the Township Planning Board.

QUESTION: Who are those that object to industrial zoning?

ANSWER: Objections are mostly from people who are enjoying the present setup and wish it to remain that way. The Township is not thickly populated and they are getting by with the services provided. They mistakenly do not expect a rapid growth and expect that they will be able to afford the expense of any additional facilities that come.

QUESTION: Can Farmington retain its wide open spaces as it is constituted now?

ANSWER: No. The demand for residences will fill in all the open areas within the next two decades. As these areas begin to fill there will be an increasing demand for all municipal services and this in turn brings in more residents. In order to retain a degree of open space it is necessary that a balanced tax base provide for competing industrial and commercial tax contribution. It is best to reserve a proper balance of land and space to permit industrial and commercial expansion in line with the residential expansion. It is better to have these expansions in their own exclusive areas in the Township as this proves to be the most satisfactory arrangement in both cases. Properties that change ownership will not decrease in value.

QUESTION: Is there a point where taxes make it unprofitable to

impossible to hold on to residential property?

ANSWER: Yes, when taxes approach about 3 percent of the true value or sale value of the property. Most people cannot afford this expense.

QUESTION: Is there a point where the purchasing of a home plus taxes and assessments become unprofitable or impossible for most people?

ANSWER: Yes, when the yearly amount of this outgo exceeds 25 percent of the available income (take-home pay).

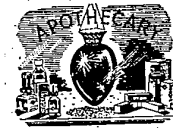
TOOLS

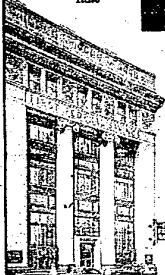

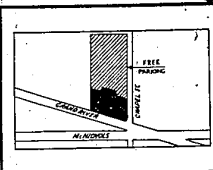
