YWCA 2nd Term Sat. Recreation Program to Open January 11

Registration is now open for the Northwest YWCA's Saturday Recreation Program at Cody High School. The winter term will begin on Saturday, January 11th and last for 10 Saturdays, through March 15th.

The classes offered in the program are Dramatics, social and folk dancing, recreational games, swimming (for girls and women only), crafts, drawing and painting, creative dance (for girls only), and fencing. The program is designed primarily for the junior high school age group.

An opportunity awaits the very young girls between the ages of 2½ and 5 years to learn to swim in this class, the mothers assist their small fry in the pool. This swimming class is under the direction of Mr. Bert Hubbard and will be held from 10:15 to 11:00 a.m.

Two adult swimming classes are also included in the program. Each class will last for 15 minutes. The beginners swim from 11:00 to 11:45. The adult intermediates swim from 11:45 to 12:30 p.m.

Seven swimming classes for junior girls and teen-agers are offered including synchronized swimming.

Anyone enrolling in the swimming classes is required to make an appointment with the Northwest YWCA for a medical examination given by the YWCA physician.

All of the classes except swimming are divided according to ages. Dramatics is open to boys and girls 10 through 16 years. Social and folk dancing in open to boys and girls 12 years and up. Girls and boys 6 through 11 may enroll in recreational games. Creative dance will be open to girls 6 through 12 years. Children 8 years and up may enroll in fencing, crafts, and drawing and painting. A full morning's schedule may include 3 or 4 classes of the child's choice.

Stork's Visit Preparation Classes Slated

How many diapers shall I buy? What does it mean when the mother is Rh negative and the father Rh positive? How do you know when a baby is hungry? He cries for everything, doesn't he?

Questions like these are raised in classes for expectant parents conducted by public health nurses and sponsored by the Oakland County Department of Health, Pontiac City Department of Health, and various Adult Education Departments.

Expectant parents' classes offer an opportunity for parents to gain knowledge and understanding that will help to increase their enjoyment in this experience and will prepare them to give care when baby arrives. The first four classes are centered around the mother.

There is ample opportunity for discussions of family adjustments, growth and development of the baby before birth and labor and delivery. The last four classes cover feeding of the baby, what the new baby is like and baby's first year.

Audio-visual aids are used to supplement discussion and conducted hospital tours are arranged during classes.
