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AN AUTOMATIC GAS DRYER SAVES TIME, WORK AND MONEY

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Township Industrial Zoning

The following question and answer series in explanation of the various phases of the proposed industrial zoning for Farmington Township is being presented as a matter of public information by the Township Planning Board.

Q. Isn't it possible that the owners of the property proposed to be rezoned for industry will be unable to find buyers interested in acquiring the same for industrial use?

A. Planning is not a static thing and it is, of course, possible that part of the area in question will never develop industrially, notwithstanding the rezoning to an industrial classification. If such is the case, there should be little opposition to again rezoning such property back to residential (or commercial) use after the passage of a reasonable time without any signs of industrial development. However, there is every indication that the property in question will develop industrially and without any great delay. The experience of other communities in the Detroit metropolitan area indicates that many small industries will be interested in locating here, even though no municipal water or sewer facilities are yet available in the area. I.e. industries prepared to furnish their own water and sewage facilities.

Q. Why are the sites proposed for industrial zoning located at the edge of the township?

A. There are many factors, including topography, the absence of a substantial number of houses or other structure, and the availability of expressway transportation, which makes the area in question one of the most desirable one for industry in Farmington Township. However, part of the explanation concerns the matter of overall planning consistent with that of our neighbors. Thus, Novi Township

mented a doubling of the intangibles tax.

The levy is on stocks, bonds and other intangibles—including annuities bought years ago by workers to make their lives more secure in their old age.

"It's a tax on thrift, let's face it," said Senator Edward Hutchinson (R-Fennville).

Republicans generally are wary of Williams' tax idea this year.

They claim he liked the intangibles tax plan from one preliminary report of a citizen group to a Republican study of the state's revenue structure.

Rep. Robt. G. Conlin (R-Tipton), chairman of the study, said Williams was "unfair" to run with the ball on a partial report.

Williams' plan would raise \$21,000,000 if it achieved his expectations. Only part of the total needed this year to keep the state solvent until Conlin's tax plan is completed in 1959.
