

Falcons Rally in Last Half to Beat Van Dyke; to Meet S'field Friday

The Farmington Senior High basketball team will face second-place Southfield tomorrow night in the F.H.S. gym. The Falcons go in to the Southfield game following successive wins over Clarenceville and Van Dyke.

In last Friday's contest with Van Dyke, the Falcons trounced the Abes 45-36, after Van Dyke held a narrow lead at half-time.

In the first period Van Dyke outscored the Falcons 13-12, as forward George Hatch of the Abes tallied 11 points. The Abes increased their lead to two points during the second quarter and held a 25-23 lead at half-time.

Van Dyke scored a point on a free throw early in the third period. Meanwhile the Falcons scored nine points, giving them a 32-26 third quarter lead which they held for the remainder of the game.

Farmington remained in command during the last period to win its second conference game of the season, 54-49.

The game last Friday was a small-scale reversal of the previous meeting between the teams. A month ago the Abes beat Farmington 50-38, despite Farmington's half-time lead.

George Hatch of Van Dyke scored 22 points Friday to lead both teams. Top scorers for Farmington were Dave Catherman, 14; Ralph Garry, 12; and Harvey Chapman, 10.
