Great Books Training Course To Begin Soon

Farmington area residents are invited to a tuition free Great Books Leadership Training Course to begin in March. Mrs. James D. Worley, Great Books Detroit Coordinator, states: "Interest in the Great Books Program has grown to such an extent that new leaders, or moderators, are needed so that new groups may be formed," Mrs. Worley said.

The classes, which will be conducted by staff members of the Detroit Book Foundation, Chicago, Illinois, will be held in the Auditorium, Detroit Main Library, 5201 Woodward Avenue, every Monday for two weeks beginning March 10, from 8 to 10 p.m.

The Great Books Leadership Training Course is being sponsored by all the local libraries within a fifty mile radius of Detroit in association with the Adult Education Department of the Detroit Public Library.

These lessons are to train individuals in the theory and technique of leading a group of neighbors, friends and co-workers in a discussion study of the Great Books. The classes will include demonstration and practice discussions of works selected from the Great Books reading lists. "The Declaration of Independence" is studied in Aristotle's "Politics." Plato's "Allegory" and Shakespeare's "Macbeth" will also be discussed.
