# No Increase in Tax Rate Needed to Finance School Bond Issue

Approval will provide \$110,000,000 for the tion and equipping of two new elementary schools, \$100,000 for a school district service building and \$300,000 for additional school sites.

No increase in the school district's debt service tax rate will be necessary to finance this bond proposition, school officials emphasized. A decrease in the rate of payment on previous bonds plus an increased lequalized assessed valuation of the district, due to new home and commercial construction, makes this possible.

BASED on an estimated State equalized valuation for the school district of \$70,000,000, the following data has been compiled to graphically illustrate how this is possible. (It is the State equalized valuation upon which school taxes are based and not assessed valuation)

Notice should be taken of the fact that the \$3.60 rate per \$1,000 State equalized valuation on the 1964 bond issue will provide considerably more than is needed to meet 1958 payments. This extra money will make it possible to pay off callable bonds and thus save a substantial amount of interest payments on later maturing bonds, nuthorities

IF THE STATE equalized valuation of the district should run considerably higher than the estimated \$70,000,000 (approximately 10% increase over last year) a re-

duction in the debt service tax rate will be possible, Superintendent G. V. Harrison stated, Since a complete re-appraisal of City of Farmington property has been made and
a considerable amount of re-assessing doile in the township
as well, it is impossible to tell at this time what the State
equalized valuation of the school district might be.

A reduction in the State equalization factors used last
year, approximately double the assessed valuations in both
the city and township, is anticipated. If the factor is reduced to the extent officials estimate it should be then
the approximate \$70,000,000 equalized valuation for the
school district should not be too far off, school officials
feel. If, however, these factors are not reduced this much,
a higher \$2 tax equalized valuation for the district will result and some adjacents downward in the debt service tax
rate might be made.

WYTH THE RAPID population increases in the school

WITH THE RAPID population increases in the school district, which started around 1950, the need for a continu-

ous school building program began to present itself. A new semior high school was built and a start made to provide additional elementary classrooms needed. Residential building was continuing at an accelerated rate, however, and by 1963 it was necessary for several elementary grades to be on double-sessions. A bond issue was thus put to a vote in 1954 to provide for the construction of three new elementary schools (Eagle, Gill Road and Shiawassee) and an addition at the high school. Before the grade schools were even completed, however, they were filled to capacity and beyond
