Taking Part in Marine Landing

Marine Pfc. Lawrence G. Surprenant, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Anthes of 26820 Farmington Road is now taking part in a major Atlantic Fleet amphibious exercise off the coast of North Carolina with the 2nd Marine Division from Camp Lejeune.

The exercise, designed to train the Marines in modern amphibious warfare, got underway March 13 when the Leathernecks boarded ships at Norfolk, Virginia, Morehead City, North Carolina, and Vieques, Puerto Rico.

Following preliminary landings by helicopter, the main amphibious assault landing was made March 22 on Onslow Beach, N.C. The exercise will come to an end March 31 after a week of operations ashore.

Speed, dispersal, mobility and the use of atomic weapons are being stressed by the 20,000 Marines, 10,000 sailors, 60 ships and 200 aircraft taking part in the operation.
