Donald Howell, biology instructor, was in attendance at the National Science Teachers' Association convention. He was a delegate to the convention, which was held in Denver, Colorado, March 28 through Saturday, March 29 in Denver, Colorado.

Mr. Howell was able to attend the convention as a result of a program initiated this year by Detroit industry. Under this program, various industries will pay full plane expenses to fly Detroit area science teachers to and from the convention. The Parke Davis Company will pay Mr. Howell's plane fare. Mr. Howell stated that the convention "dealt primarily with science teaching and science education." There were sessions on both the elementary and secondary levels. When Mr. Howell returns from Denver, he will make a report on the convention to the Kiwanis Club and to the Parke Davis Company.
