habits the capitol for the next two years.

Economy threats and maneuvers have made a difference in Lansing. Six weeks ago, Senator Elmer R. Porter (R-Blissfield) estimated that coffee breaks, late breakfasts and extra time off costs the state up to \$15,000,000 a year in employee time.

Administration executives, noting the economic recession, claim that workers have become more conscientious — especially since Jan. 1.

Porter's attack on the coffee break has had its impact, too. "I understand abuses have been reduced since then," he said.

MICHIGAN HAS ANOTHER Fitzgerald waiting in the wings for his try at politics.

First there was John W. Fitzgerald, the member of the House who held office. Then came Frank D. Fitzgerald, his son, who was the state's Republican governor in the 1930s.
