### What's New at the — LIBRARY

Several particularly interesting books were added at the library recently. Included are: "The Wrath Woman" - The story of Iaric married Elizabeth Fones - Winthrop - Hallett, niece, ward, and daughter - in - law of Governor John Winthrop, who defied all Puritan conventions and heritage to live a life of her own choosing. As in her past novels, Miss Seton's work shows painstaking research on the period and morals of the English people and those of the American colonies. Almost the first third of the book is devoted to the fourteen years prior to the Winthrop immigration from England in order to show the factors determining the New England. The reader of the tale is rich with the language and details of everyday life. Famous personages of colonial days and their strengths and weaknesses. Upmost is "Bess" Winthrop, defiant of the narrowness of life and though, often defeated and humiliated, but in the end triumphant.

"Evelyn Anthony - 'Victoria and Albert'" - This novel, covers the first two decades of the reign of Victoria and Albert. It presents her as a vulnerable human being; here is Victoria the indomitable queen, the loving wife, (oblivious to the fact that Albert did not return the love and mother of nine children). Albert emerges from this novel as a man of stature and not merely as the husband of Victoria. The story ends with the death of Albert.

Paul Wellman "Ride the Red Earth" - The odyssey of Louis St. Denis began in a Quebec spring in the early 1700s and ended 2,500 miles south and two years later in a Mexican city dungeon of the Inquisition.

Betty Smith - "Maggie Noe" - Betty Smith's Dunn Moore family face the struggles of poverty and those resulting from the herding together of heterogeneous racial and religious groups. The story tells the Johnny Nolan family in "The Tree Grows in Brooklyn". Those who were too young to appreciate "The Tree" when it was a best seller, will enjoy this.

Robert Traver - "Anatomy of a Murder" - Current No. 1 best seller. Account of a murder trial in Michigan's Upper Peninsula by a Supreme Court Justice of Michigan which stresses the court room technique rather than the human emotions. Already slated for Broadway and Film production.

Helen and Frank Schreider - "20,000 Miles South; a Pan-American Adventure." For the armchair traveler here is the fascination and romance of new places told by a young U.C.L.A. couple who drove for 8 years of driving from Circle, Alaska to Tierra del Fuego in a sea - going, mountain climbing, amphibious jeep. After overcoming such obstacles as hurricanes, high surf, unbridged rivers, and lack of roads, they accomplished this feat and tell it with ease and charm. Illustrated by hand drawings of Helen Schreider and photographs taken on the trip by Frank Schreider.

### New Super-Highway To Affect School Sites

If the route of the new 11 1/2 mile east - west super - highway follows the course presently proposed at least three possible school sites will be affected to some extent, Superintendent G. V. Harrison informed the School Board Monday night.

Following discussion, the Board directed the administration to send a letter to the State Highway Department pointing out the School District's present policy of locating sites at the corner of each section in the township whenever possible. 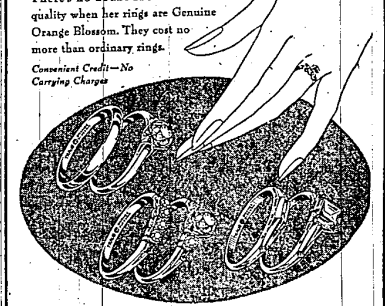
