**Supplies Piano Music for Movie Farewell to Arms**

Area residents who attend the movie "A Farewell to Arms" may be interested to know that the piano lines for the film's sound track were recorded by Miss June Toth, former Michigan State University student from Farmington.

Miss Toth supplied the music for the film version of the Hemingway novel during the summer of 1937 in Europe.

The pianist has used her talents to help the people of several European countries. Last October she appeared in a concert to raise funds for the new Beda College for English students in Rome. Later she was the featured pianist in a concert sponsored by Tito Schipa for the benefit of blind and needy orphans of Rome.

Miss Toth, a student in applied piano at M.S.U., went to Europe in 1953, just after graduation. She received a scholarship at the Accademia Nazionale Di Santa Cecilia in Rome. In 1955 she finished her study on a scholarship at the Mozarteum in Salzburg, Austria.

During her years at Michigan State, Miss Toth was a student of Ernest Victor Wolff and became well known for her outstanding piano performances. She was a member of Delta Omicron, women's national music fraternity.
