New County Child Service Set Up

A new Children's Protective Service Division is now being set up by Oakland County Probate Judge Arthur Moore.

Returning to serve as director of the new division is the former director of children's services for Oakland County, William R. McCarthy, 46, of 2405 Walce Road, West Bloomfield Township. He served as director of children's services from October of 1948 to April of 1954. Before returning here he was administrative assistant to the Catholic Charities of Washington, a position he held four years.

The new division which McCarthy will direct is another of Judge Moore's attempts in helping children in the county "in becoming an asset rather than a liability of the community."
