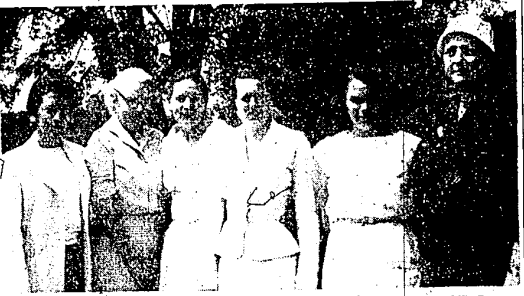

What "Torch Drive" Provides
Brought Out at Meeting Here

At a meeting of Area Chairman for the 1958 United Foundation Torch Drive held here last week, top U. F. officials were on hand to go over the chairman's guide book step by step and answer any questions raised.

Present were Mrs. Victor H. Marsh, Oakland County Chairman; Mrs. Palmer B. Bundy, "Torch" Staff Director for Oakland County. The meaning of "Give Once For All" was explained in detail. It is a slogan and a stated principle. As a slogan, this is the call of the Torch Drive volunteer and as a principle, it sums up the aim and purpose of the United Foundation, officials commented.

United Foundation exists to support all recognized, person-to-person solicitations. The fact that some of these campaigns exist outside the Torch Drive does not destroy the above principle. Your United Foundation gives the door open for their inclusion. It's up to you, the contributor, to see that they enter, an official spokesman said. "You are the one to decide, but all qualified appeals are best served through the United Foundation Torch Drive."

These facts were brought out at the meeting. One hundred and ninety-five voluntary health and welfare agencies annually receive all or part of their operating budgets from proceeds of the Torch Drive. These services fall into the following groups: 116 services of the United Community Services; 40 services of the Michigan United Fund. These are State and National; 27 services in new United Foundation territory, of which Farmington United Foundation and Community Chest is one; 12 independent services including such agencies as: American Red Cross (three chapters); American Cancer Society - Southeastern Michigan Division; Metropolitan Detroit Police Foundation; Detroit U.S.O.

Everyone benefits from the services of Torch Drive agencies. One out of every three families receives direct services from Torch Drive dollars.

Every citizen is a beneficiary of the money spent by the United Foundation for research leading to the cure and care of killing and crippling diseases. In addition every citizen enjoys the security of living in a community where adequate recreation, health and welfare services, and emergency aid are assured. Luncheons, dinners and other events held in connection with the Torch Drive, are paid for by the state and industrial firms and others, over and above campaign contributions. There is no cost to United Foundation. The Torch was selected as the campaign symbol because it represents the light which is brought into so many lives through the Torch Drive.

COLOR AND FRAGRANCE
