

That's Goal Of Jesus Movement Bring Back Old-Time Religion

Surprising to find that a self-styled ex-Mafia figure, a former mental patient, dope addict, dope pusher, college graduate and even a normal person all have more than "something" in common.

As they explain it, it's the Jesus Movement, but not as we "Sunday Christians" understand it. It's a seven-day-a-week affair.

This group of people, numbering 300 in all, is headquartered in a church at Newburgh and Ann Arbor Trail in

Livonia, called The Full Gospel Church.

They're attempting to revive old-time religion through the Jesus Movement which they call "nothing more than Jesus moving."

One member said Jesus fixed her garbage disposal.

"When it broke, my sister and I laid our hands on it and prayed for the Lord to fix it. Nothing happened then, but when I came back a few minutes later and turned it on, it worked. I know the Lord fixed it."

As the saying goes, the Lord does move in mysterious ways.

The church was started six years ago by Pastor John Cossin, a former advocate of the Pentecostal Church.

The Jesus Movement began two years ago with four members and has since grown to 200. Although the majority of the members are young, there are some older ones.

"There are a lot of interested older people throughout the area that are helping with the church," Cossin says.

Many members led lives of crime and many didn't.

They're all from various denominations, but they're all united in working for the Lord.

"I have a compassion to work with young people. What they want is reality and they get it here."

The church is open to everyone from 8 a.m. to midnight every day and there is a 24-hour prayer line. Bible studies are held every day and services are held every day except Mondays and Tuesdays.

According to one member, over 1,000 people have been saved in the church.

Pastoral Care Clinic Offered

Several well-known evangelical ministers from this area and from across the nation will team up at the Maranatha Conference Grounds in Muskegon this month to help midwest pastors and ministers do "An Update on Pastoral Care."

A three-day clinic for clergy on Aug. 27, 28 and 29 is part of a week-long "Festival of Missions" sponsored by World Vision International, inter-denominational Christian service organization.

Featured speakers will be Dr. Paul S. Rees of Minneapolis, WVI vice president - at large and director of pastors' conferences, and Dr. Stephan F. Olford of New York, minister at large of Encounter Ministries Inc. Both are experienced in leadership training among pastors.

Formerly pastor of Calvary Baptist Church in N.Y. for 14 years, Dr. Olford has become known throughout the world to thousands of radio listeners via "The Calvary Church Hour." The weekly program is broadcast in the Caribbean, Great Britain, Europe, Africa, Central and South America, Australia, the South Pacific and the United States. He is also heard on "Encounter," a 30 minute radio-TV broadcast throughout the U.S. and abroad.

Dr. Olford's talks are titled: "Linking the Classical with the Contemporary," "The Pastor as a Caring Person" and "Pastor, What do you see When you Look in the Mirror?"

Dr. Rees has been ministering to pastors the world over for more than 20 years. A former President of the National Association of Evangelicals, he was minister to ministers for Billy Graham Crusades in Europe in the 1950s. As director of pastors' conferences for WVI he has participated in more than 80 meetings for clergy in 32 countries.

In addition to Olford and Rees, other speakers will include the Rev. Ray Stedman, author of "Body Life," and missionary-evangelist David Morken; both are from California. Also, the Rev. Ted Schaap of Grand Rapids and Dr. Henry Bast, pastor emeritus of the Bethany Reformed Church, Grand Rapids.

Getting People Involved-- It's A Rabbi's Challenge

FARMINGTON

Adas Shalom Synagogue of Farmington is Rabbi Seymour Rosenbloom's first pulpit as a rabbi. Actually, he is assistant rabbi to Rabbi Jacob Segel, but it is still Rabbi Rosenbloom's first venture into the rabbinate.

Before coming to Farmington about a year ago, the 28-year-old rabbi had been a teacher in the Hebrew schools in New York and New Jersey. He was graduated from the University of Rochester, studied at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, entered the Jewish Theological Seminary of America in 1966, received his M.H.L. in 1970 and was later ordained.

The year at the Farmington synagogue has been a good one for him. He likes the idea of sharing responsibilities with the senior rabbi, as opposed to being slotted into one area.

"The rabbinate here cuts across all lines," he says.

While he has a lot of contact with the young people of the synagogue, his concerns encompass a broad age range. He wants to see not only a large group of young people actively involved at the synagogue, but an equally large group of adults.

Mrs. Sandra Rosen was recently appointed director of education for youth at the synagogue. The programs for young people are being expanded.

The rabbi says the idea of having the youth lounge open one evening a week as a gathering place for teens has proved a success.

"I'm really pleased with the response. The lounge has been open Wednesday evenings for ping pong, pool, refreshments and we've had a regular attendance of between 25 and 30 kids. This fall we'll combine it with the school on Wednesdays and after classes more kids will probably drop by."

HE MENTIONS that some churches have been doing this sort of thing, but it is re-

latively new for the synagogue.

"The failure of Judaism lies in not being able to involve our young people actively. We are interested in seeing that all young people who want to be involved are involved."

"Judaism, as I think any religion, is not solely to entertain kids, but rather to prepare them with associations which will bring them back when they're mature."

NOSTALGIA is one of the keys to getting people to participate in the religious life of the synagogue, the rabbi feels.

"The older generations have a certain nostalgia. Our young people often don't have it in the family. We want to create that kind of nostalgia -- to get a person to seek involvement because his roots are there. We want to do more than convey information. We want to create attitudes. That's what we're in business for -- to create attitude changes."

He does not feel this is exclusively a conscious mental process which comes directly through study and learning. The nostalgia, the feeling of having roots, heritage and tradition all play a part.

THE CHALLENGE is to provide something for every-

Participation was a bit disappointing, the rabbi says. Possibly because there were too many major events tightly scheduled.

Starting this fall, the schedule will include four major events, two lectures by outstanding speakers and two concerts, one of which will feature the Detroit Symphony Orchestra. There also will be a Sunday brunch series on relationships in a changing society.

The problems, the suburban atmosphere and the newness all provide challenges for the young rabbi.

He sees the constant evaluation of the programs as healthy and leading to fitting the activities to the neighborhood and larger surrounding area.

It's a case of using modern ideas to build and instill a love of the ancient traditions, to make the synagogue the place to be and more and more people saying, "yes, the synagogue is for me."
