Attend National Presbyterian Women's Meet

Mrs. Edgar Moshammer and Mrs. Douglas Hammill of Farmington were among more than 1,000 women in attendance at the fifth quadrennial meeting of the National Council of Women's Organizations at Purdue University in West Lafayette, Indiana, from June 25 to July 1.

This national meeting was the last one to be held by women's organizations of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., which last month merged with the United Presbyterian Church of North America to form the more than three million member United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A.

Representatives of women's groups of the former United Presbyterian Church of North America were guests at the week-long meeting. Other delegates and visitors included women from churches in Egypt, Cuba, Brazil, Alaska, Chile, Mexico, Indonesia, and Cameroon, West Africa. Nearly 200 missionaries and church members from national missions and overseas fields attended.

Highlight of the meeting was the adoption of a "Charter for Christian Action" drawn up on the basis of recommendations coming from more than 3,000 local study groups conducted during the past year. The charter will guide the efforts of Presbyterian Women's Organizations in their work at home and abroad.

The opening session featured a keynote address by Mrs. Paul Moser, outstanding United Presbyterian Church leader, based on the overall theme, "He is Lord of All."

Special music was provided by massed choirs from Indiana and an interracial choir from Chicago.
