Timely Tips on GARDENING

SUMMER LAWN CARE
Green, velvety lawns are the perfect foil for summer's gay profusion of flowers, but the hot, sunny days that make the flowers so colorful, are not ideal for growing grass. Some special care is needed to keep the lawn looking its best throughout the summer.
The mower should be set so that the cutting height is two and one-half to three inches. This is a simple adjustment to make on most mowers. The clippings should be left on the lawn. The longer blades of grass and the mulch of clippings will shield the roots from the hot sun, help to prevent scorching and drying.
If rains are sparse the lawn can use a thorough soaking each week. Water long enough so that the soil is wet to a depth of six inches. Light sprinklings are definitely harmful, even if frequently given. Deep watering encourages long, deep graying roots to grow. Light sprinkling keeps the roots near the surface where they are more subject to damage from heat and dryness. It is better to not water at all if the soil can not be given a thorough soaking. Even though it browns in mid-summer, well-rooted grass responds quickly to soaking rains and will turn green again.
A mid-season application of fertilizer will help keep lawns healthy. A 10-6-4 formula, high in nitrogen, is recommended for lawn feeding. A lighter application may be used now than in the Spring or Fall when grass is growing more rapidly. Divide the amount to be used in two entire lawns and then spread the remaining half over the lawn, turning the spreader at right angles to the first part of the application. This insures a more even application with no stripes showing up. Be sure to water well after spreading the fertilizer so that it will not burn the grass.
Crab grass is a problem in many lawns. Now, when the seeds are just beginning to germinate, the blades are tender, is a good time to apply a chemical crab-grass killer. D-S M A is highly effective.
