## A.A.U.W. Gathering Books for Annual Sale Here Oct. 14

Gathering books for its sixth October Book Sale, the American Association of University Women, Farmington Branch, recalls that more than 2,000 books and magazines were sold last year to new readers.

Scheduled for October 1 through 4 under the familiar tent on the Town Hall green, the sale will be open each day from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. with closing time Saturday at 5 p.m.

Money raised by all A.A.U.W. branches in their traditional used book sales goes into the Association's Fellowship Fund. The Fund annually awards National and International Fellowships to gifted women scholars for graduate study and research here or abroad, as well as International Grants to professional women of other countries for study in the United States.

The Fellowship Program has grown in size and importance through the years, stated Mrs. Henry Merigan, Farmington Branch Fellowship chairman. Forty-three awards totaling \$105,500 have been announced for 1958-59 compared to one award of \$50 in 1930.

Each year A.A.U.W. Fellows venture into new fields of study, completing doctoral theses on long pending post-graduate research.

International Grants were added to the Fellowship Program in 1945 as an aid to reconstruction in war devastated countries. Continued as an instrument of peace and understanding, the Grants have brought 39 outstanding women each year to the United States for periods of study in our universities.

Collecting books for the sale, a year-around activity of branch members, gains momentum in September as donations of a few to a boxful are picked up. All books of any age and subject matter are acceptable. The wide assortment enables buyers who agree with Bennett Cori that "reading is a pleasure of the mind" to leave the tent with armloads of this potential pleasure for a small investment.

Giving books to the sale brings bouquet of white roses and stephanotis.
