Half of Youths' Deaths Accident

Almost half of all deaths among Michigan children of school age are caused by accidents, the Michigan Department of Health announced today. "We hope that calling attention to this fact will spur parents and school teachers to attempt to do everything they can to help reduce this unnecessary loss of life," explained Dr. Goldie B. Corneliuson, director of maternal and child health for the state health department.

He is especially impressed by the fact that in 1957, accidents claimed 103 lives of school age children in Michigan, or 47 per cent of the total deaths of that age group. Motor vehicles accounted for the major share of the accidental deaths, causing 294 fatalities, or 88 per cent of the total accidental deaths.

Dr. Corneliuson said, "It is especially important for children to learn to follow safety rules during those activities which statistics show to be especially dangerous for them. These activities include going to school, riding bicycles, and, if the youngsters are old enough, driving a motor scooter or a car."

Brawm, Medical Superintendent for the Northville State Hospital, will address a special meeting of the Citizens' Auxiliary Committee, Sunday, October 12, at 3:45 p.m. in the hospital auditorium. Dr. Brown's topic, "Our Hospital, Its Immediate Past, Present and The Outlook for the Future" will evaluate the financial situation in terms of treatment, care and research facilities for the more than 2,600 patients at the hospital. Opened in January, 1952, Northville State Hospital has been nationally recognized as a leader in the field of treatment. Recently, honors were accorded the administration and staff of the hospital by the National Inspection Board of the American Psychiatric Association. These will be explained by Dr. Brown.
