

New '59 Fords Go on Display This Friday at Berling-McHugh

New 1959 Ford models will go on display locally this Friday at Berling-McHugh, Inc. at 30711 Grand River Avenue.

Being offered this year by Ford is a longer and lower car with what the company calls "styling elegance" and one which has been engineered for greater gasoline economy.

The 1959 models range up to six inches longer and two inches lower. Changes in the power plant are claimed to be able to provide savings of up to \$1 for each tank of gasoline because they permit the use of regular grade gasoline in all standard engines.

The new Ford line includes 17 models ranging from the Custom 300's through the six station wagons to the Fairlane and Fairlane-500's. All models are on a 116-inch wheel base and will have an over-all length of 200 inches.
