### Editorial Page Swim Pool Deaths

In our suburban areas the use of private swimming pools is going to continue to grow rapidly. Not only are they fun and healthful, but it's a good way to provide something for young people when there is often not too much to do unless onsiderable distances are traveled.

The township officials recognized this

trend when they passed a year ago the ordinance regulating building and use of

ordinance regulating building and use of private swimming pools. These provide that all such pools shall be enclosed by a fence at least four feet high and that gates shall be secured when not in use. They also demand adequate supervision when the pools are in use.

The trouble is, the regulations provided in the ordinance have not been enforced in all instances. Township officials held an emergency meeting Sunday morning to talk about prompt enforcement measures. They tried to get representatives from as many groups as possible. The manner in which these ideas and plans from this and subsequent meetings. The manner in which these locas and plans from this and subsequent meetings are carried out, will to great extent determine how, many drownings happen in this township. The officials are alerted now. So it's up to present and future pool owners also to be alerted to the dangers.

ers also to be derted to the dangers. We doubt if a swimming pool has been built where the owner hasn'd covered the situation with adequate liability insurance. This will protect the owner against financial loss in case of lan accident or death. It wouldn't make him feel much better, however, if in his own pool some youngsted drowned—whether it was his jown or a related youngster, or the son or daughter of some neighbor.

There are some other interesting facets to this problem. It is our understandets to this proofers. It is our understand-ing the township attempted to interest the Village of Wood Creek Farms in an ordinance similar to its own. Wood Creek didn't have such an ordinance, but the first drowning happened there.

Graving happened there.

Quakertown village was approved in August, and a charter commission there is preparing a proposal which residents will vote upon one of these days. In the light of these drownings, we presume there is a possibility the new village might also wish to adopt swimming pool regulations when it finally does break away, from the townshin. from the township.


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
