Falcons Need Win Over Berkley

The Farmington Falcons will travel to Berkley tomorrow night, Friday where they will meet the Bears under the lights.

The Falcons will be going all out for victory since they here would virtually assure them of undisputed first place championship in the Inter-Lakes conference. With only Van Dyke left to play, the Falcons should have little trouble since the Van Dyke team has shown little against other conference foes this season and set to score a victory.

Should the Falcons let down and lose this Friday against the Bears, however, the league could well be settled up in a three-way tie for first place. Berkley

has lost only one game this year while chalking up two wins, as has powerful Walled Lake.

Showing themselves as championship material last Friday, the Falcons built a 14-0 lead during the first half and put up a stellar defense against Walled Lake speedsters Frank Fink, Mike Wurst and Tom Phelps until the closing moments of the game.

It was Farmington's hard hitting defense which set up their first touchdown. On the first play from scrimmage, a hard hit Walled Lake back fumbled the ball and Farmington's Jack Lawing and John Dempsy recovered it. It was just six plays later that quarterback Allan LeSage went into the end zone for the first score of the game. Tom Grimshaw claimed the longest run of the drive, 11 yards. Harvey Chapman, who again had a perfect day with two far, faked an extra point. During the drive, Walled Lake did not show any strong resistance and Farmington's hopes grew higher with a 7-0 lead.

Farmington's second score was set up on another Viking fumble.

After Neil Stevenson recovered on Farmington's 49 yard line the Falcons sustained a 51 yard drive to pay dirt.

Mike Agee, Farmington's hard running tailback who excelled Friday with many important runs, carried the ball over the line for the Falcon's second score.

Agee's touchdown, combined with Chapman's extra point, gave Farmington a 14-0 lead.

The second Falcon score out-did the first as it took only four plays.

During the rest of the second quarter the ball went back and forth between the goals. Twice it looked as though Farmington would score and twice they were stopped short by a tough-tackling Berkley defense.

The Falcon defense recovered another Walled Lake fumble in the closing minutes of the half, removing any hope the Vikings had for a first half score.

During the halftime the homecoming queen and her court were presented in special halftime ceremonies conducted on the playing field.

The second half kickoff was taken by Agee, of Farmington and brought back to the Falcon 29 yards, with a penalty put it back on the 15.

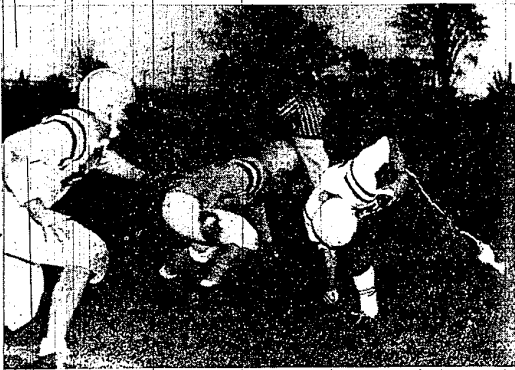

As a wing, he has been sent out to throw back blocks in the foe's secondary or to become a potential pass receiver. That Grimshaw knows what to do when he does carry the ball is shown quite clearly here. With two Viking tacklers coming in on him fast, he goes down low to drive for that extra yard or two.
